Long Beach Animal Care Services gives tips on avoiding coyotes

As coyote pups start to wander out of their dens at this time of year, Long Beach Animal Care Services is warning residents to take precautions to protect themselves and their pets.

Long Beach Animal Care Services recommends residents take the following precautions to ward off coyotes:

- Never feed coyotes or any other wildlife.
- Keep pets and pet food inside. If feeding outside, feed pets during the day (no more than one hour) and remove the food and water bowls when finished.
- Stay close to your pet when taking them outdoors and always keep them on a leash, especially from dusk through early morning hours.
- Remove fallen fruit from the ground.
- Bag food wastes such as meat scraps or leftover pet food.
- Keep trash in containers with tight-fitting lids.
- Use "hazing" techniques to shoo away coyotes, such as standing tall, yelling and waving arms while approaching the coyote; using a whistle, air horn, bell or other devices; banging pots or pans together; stomping your feet; using a water hose, or throwing tennis balls, sticks or rocks at the coyote to scare it off. The intention of hazing is to scare off coyotes rather than harm them.
- Never run away from a coyote. While animal control will not respond to reports of normal coyote behavior such as sightings, personnel will respond if a person or pet is attacked, if a coyote appears to be sick or injured or if a coyote is out in the daytime near people, especially if they are near playgrounds or schools.

If a coyote is immediately threatening someone's life, call 911.

When Julio Salgado was a student at Cal State Long Beach in 2006, the word "undocumented"

carried a heavy weight.

He founded the For Undocumented Empowered Leaders organization in 2007 to help other undocumented students succeed, later graduating from the university in 2010, and just last week, Salgado completed his first mural at the CSULB Dream Success Center with fellow immigrant artist Myisha Arellanus.

"Back then being undocumented was very secretive ... you had to be

Safer LBUSD Campaign advocates for less punitive practices against students

The Safer LBUSD Campaign advocated for the Long Beach Unified School District (LBUSD) to reimagine its definition of school safety at a special meeting on Tuesday, Sept. 20.

The campaign seeks to abolish current policing practices and weapons from district employees and partners by reimagining school safety, investing in programs that support students and staff and conducting surveys to spark these conversations.

Dr. Nooshin Valizadeh, equity and inclusion consultant, conducted research for the district and Safer LBUSD on implementing equity in education, especially concerning race and gender issues.

"More police presence means more police involvement in lower-level offenses," Valizadeh said, explaining that many interactions could be better addressed by mentors or teachers rather than police.

According to information obtained from LBUSD youth focus groups facilitated by Californians for Justice, students reported wanting:

- More supportive adults on campus
- More wellness centers
- More relationships and understanding
- Less security or police presence Some of the main safety concerns raised by the focus groups are negative disciplinary interactions between teachers and students from marginalized groups such as Black students and students with disabilities. Bullying, fights and lockdowns on and off campus were also stated as factors discouraging students from attending school, according to focus group participants.

LBUSD works toward meet-

ing some of these recommendations

As of the last school year, LBUSD has established wellness centers at most high school campuses to provide students with mental health support and resources as a way to foster a sense of belonging. The district is now working on expanding these centers to the middle school level.

According to deputy superintendent Tiffany Brown, the district has updated their discipline guidelines and procedures to include language around best practices as well as concepts related to restorative justice, conflict resolution and healing circles.

"Sometimes discipline guidelines read like manuals of what not to do. There is some of that present, but we're really working to use language that promotes the behaviors that we want to see," Brown said.

Brown also said that over the last year, the district conducted a job study of all the positions within the School Safety branch to evaluate job descriptions and roles. The district also audited all school safety procedures to ensure they are up to date.

Moving forward

For Kim Tabari, LBUSD parent and organizational development director at the USC Equity Research Institute, next steps include "moving from a punitive policing model to a safety model that centers a holistic student and staff support."

Tabari also called on the board to be more proactive in the process of reimagining school safety moving forward.

"All I'm asking is that you just meet us halfway," Tabari said. "We want to know, what will you do tomorrow? How will you implement your own safety plans?"

"One thing that's been missing through this entire process has been the engagement from the board," Safer LBUSD Campaign organizer Jerlene Tatum said. "When we talk about next steps, one of the next steps is we'd like for you all to be engaged in the conversation outside of this room."

Board member Erik Miller acknowledged the importance of strategies, but said he is looking for more concrete ways to move forward.

"I'm looking for more tangible, practical components to what we'll do to support these efforts," Miller said. "I think that when we're talking about safety...we want to reevaluate it fairly often."

Some of the June 2023 goals suggested by the Safer LBUSD Campaign include:

- Defunding and dismantling the School Safety branch—the district's safety response team consisting of school safety officers who respond to calls to maintain order and discipline.
- Developing a School Climate Department to replace the School Safety branch
- Utilizing audit findings to create alternatives to punitive policies and practices
- Reinvesting in enrichment programs

"The significance of safety for me in schools takes on a significantly more impactful tone, particularly for those students that are struggling with issues of safety outside of school as well," board member Juan Benitez said.

Metropolitan Water District completes pipeline repairs ahead of schedule

Repairs to a water pipeline connecting the Colorado River to customers in Los Angeles County have been completed two days ahead of schedule, and residents and businesses are allowed to resume limited watering outdoors, it was announced Monday.

The Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWD) completed repairs on a leak on a 36-mile pipeline, described as a primary conduit for about 4 million people, and that was supposed to take 15 days to complete when it started Sept. 6.

Metropolitan Water District officials say it is estimated customers in the affected areas reduced water demands by about 30% during the

repairs.

"We know it wasn't easy to heed our no-outdoor-watering call, particularly during the extreme heat wave the region experienced early in the shutdown, but Southern Californians stepped up their water-saving efforts again, as they have in the past, to help us through this critical shutdown," Metropolitan Chairwoman Gloria D. Gray said in a statement.

Beverly Hills, Burbank, Glendale, Long Beach, Pasadena, San Fernando, and Torrance, and the Central Basin Municipal Water District, Foothill Municipal Water District, Three Valleys Municipal Water District and West Basin Municipal Water District were affected by the leak.

The MWD made a temporary repair to the leak in the pipeline ear-

lier this year, and began operating the pipeline at a reduced capacity. The MWD scheduled the shutdown to install a longer-term fix to the pipeline to avoid a possible critical failure to the water supply.

"I want to thank the crews who worked tirelessly to complete the project ahead of schedule," Metropolitan General Manager Adel Hagekhalil said. "This shutdown also required an extraordinary amount of coordination, and we wouldn't have been successful without the public's water-saving help and the cooperation and support of our affected member agencies."

Hagekhalil added that customers "must still continue saving as much water as possible to help our region through this ongoing historic drought."



Long Beach Rising returns from hiatus to send off new group of political activists

As the nation prepares for state, local and national elections in November, over 20 Long Beach residents spent three precious Saturdays throughout August and September learning strategies to increase civic participation and engagement in historically underrepresented neighborhoods.

The community guidelines displayed at Long Beach Rising's most recent graduation at Long Beach City College on Saturday, Sept. 17 included: "Be curious," "Be respectful," "Don't yuck my yum," "Step up, step back" and "Throw glitter, not shade."

"Those committee agreements are the agreements that we collectively came up with on day one around like, 'How do we want to be in relation to one another, and how do we want to conduct ourselves?' said James Suazo, executive director for Long Beach Forward. "We set the culture and the standard ... if we could do this together amongst ourselves, imagine if all of our communities outside of here also represented those kinds of values and beliefs that are built on things like respect and understanding and mutuality."

The three-day program is organized by Long Beach Forward, the Long Beach Coalition for Good Jobs, Building Healthy Communities and the Los Angeles Alliance for a New Economy (LAANE), and it does more than merely imagine a better world for its participants.

The inclusive, free program focuses on teaching "how to actually tangibly organize neighborhoods, how to understand, how to change power and systems and actually apply those skills," Suazo said.

Suazo has seen eight different groups through the Long Beach Rising program, as one of the few leaders who was around during the creation of the program in 2014.

Last year's program was canceled due to COVID-19 restrictions. He helped coordinate this year's lessons for aspiring activists, which covered the principles of direct organizing and mobilization, strategy and power analysis and the importance of canvassing.

In order to apply the principles learned in the program, participants split up into four separate groups to canvass the neighborhoods surrounding Long Beach City College for two hours on Saturday.

Students and a couple of program leaders braved the 80-degree

weather to knock door-to-door and ask residents questions regarding their voting method and thoughts on Proposition 1, which will be on ballots this November. The passage of Prop 1 would change the California Constitution to ensure that the state cannot interfere with a person's reproductive rights, including the right to an abortion.

The questions posed to residents during the canvassing event were:

- How do you plan to vote? (Options include a voting center, ballot dropbox, mailing your ballot and not sure/not voting)
- Will you stand with us to support reproductive healthcare rights?
- Are you interested in staying connected with us (Long Beach Rising) and getting more info on upcoming events?

"I plan on taking what I've learned here and just applying it to my own community, my family, my neighbors and seeing what role I can play in ... having more people aware of their power as residents in Long Beach," said Ivan Garcia, Long Beach Rising 2022 graduate.

Garcia grew up in the neighborhood around Poly High School and said he had "been around the block a few times" in terms of canvassing for issues. A summer internship with LAANE coupled with his experience working for the Long Beach Coalition For Good Jobs and a Healthy Community inspired Garcia to get more involved in his community.

"Community organizing can be grueling and can be difficult, but at the same time, it's also very rewarding, especially when we have our victories, and that's something that keeps us going," Garcia said. "I realized that it keeps the movements going and I think that's part of the reason why I'm here. I want to figure out what role I can play and how I can fit into some positive community."

According to Marlene Montanez, associate director for Long Beach Forward, many Long Beach Rising graduates go on to work for political organizations, election campaigns for a proposition or politician, nonprofits or other institutions in the city.

Long Beach Rising collaborates with different organizations each year to make the programming fit whatever issues are viewed as most important at the time. Partnerships have included Long Beach Gray Panthers, Khmer Girls in Action, Long Beach Immigrant Rights Coalition, the California Faculty Association and more, creating a network for students to explore future career opportunities.

"Take this as your welcome into the movement," Montanez said to this year's graduates. "Don't think of this as you're done, think of it as you're just getting started."

Long Beach resident Antonio
Hernandez has spent the last year
and a half promoting COVID-19
resources in various languages for
residents in North, West and Central Long Beach. He said his desire
to enter a leadership role is what
motivated him to join the Long
Beach Rising program.

Hernandez said he will leave the program "having a better context, history [and] understanding of Long Beach ... Just seeing how our current structures—specifically in Long Beach—are set up, and whether that's to benefit certain groups or leave people behind."


Students took turns sharing what they learned from the program and listened to political activists from Long Beach share stories of their struggles and victories. Councilmember Roberto Uranga gave a speech to the graduates, congratulating them on the important work they are pursuing.

"It's not easy and it takes a lot of courage to stand up for what you believe in," Uranga said. "Programs like this help you recognize the people who have the energy and the passion to continue the activism ... It starts somewhere and it starts here."

In Photos: Moompetam American Indian Festival returns to the Aquarium of the Pacific

The sound of chanting and drums welcomed guests at the Aquarium of the Pacific last weekend for its 18th annual Moompetam American Indian Festival.

The weekend of education and art was made in collaboration with the tribes that originally inhabited the Southern California coast.

Moompetam comes from the Tongva word for saltwater and is used to describe the "people of the ocean." The Tongva, Chumash, Acjachemen, Costanoan, Luiseno and Kumeyaay tribes are among the first natives to inhabit most of what is now the Los Angeles area.

During the festival, representatives from the Indigenous tribes displayed artwork and tools that were created by their ancestors and demonstrated how they used the land to create them. Educators showed how the leaves of the Yucca plant were used for binding and clothing, iridescent abalone shells that became jewelry and acorns that were used for food and entertainment.

In addition to the educational booths, tribal leaders also led in storytelling and performed songs and dances from their people.

very careful with who you [disclosed] your status [to]," Salgado said. "Now the fact that we've come so far that we have a whole center that's dedicated to supporting undocumented students, it's amazing."

CSULB's Dream Success Center exists to "provide holistic services, resources, and support to members of the Beach community impacted by immigration policy," according to the center's website.

The Dream Success Center reached out to Salgado about creating a mural due to his artistic background and work with undocumented students. Although Salgado graduated from CSULB with a degree in journalism, he has been making his signature, colorful graphic illustrations for years, usually including LGBTQ, Black, brown and Indigenous people.

Salgado reached out to another immigrant artist about doing a collaboration on the project. Arellanus has been painting murals "rooted in community engagement" since she was 16 years old, making her a perfect fit.

The two had worked together on previous projects which focused on "highlighting folks who are undocumented," Salgado said. They first met over a decade ago while protesting student arrests and deportations at San Bernardino Valley College.

"It was great to have a partner who I trusted who understood the vision," Salgado said. "Myisha used to be undocumented as well so [with] what we were trying to tell with this image; it was important to me to bring on someone who understood my work and understood where I was coming from and understood the message."

Arellanus has been prolific in her work, having collaborated on or restored over 30 murals and having painted 10 original pieces so far in her career. Some of her California creations include a mural in Koreatown on the sixth floor of an affordable housing building, a marine life mural on a laundromat on Fourth Street and Redondo Avenue in Long Beach and a mural depicting Black and brown college students at the California State University of Northridge, to name a few.

The two artists learned new techniques from each other over the course of a week, working on the mural in eight-hour increments. Salgado described having to learn new painting techniques, since he had never made art on a wall before, and Arellanus said her challenge was in finding the right mix of colors each day to match Salgado's usual bright illustrations.

Salgado designed the mural, sketched the outline and painted the 13 students on the mural, while Arellanus painted the background imagery in the painting, depicting marigolds, palm trees and a beach.

Arellanus is also a CSU graduate, though she almost didn't attend college due to her undocumented status when she was in high school. She recalled being scared to disclose her status to people and having to "speak in code just to ask for resources."

"There were no places back then where you could just go and ask openly and that's what the centers are now in a lot of campuses, and a lot of grassroots organizations have become those spaces," Arellanus said. "And the mural is just a visual representation of that. It depicts the history specifically of CSU Long Beach, but I can tell you that it parallels many other places ... where it's very similar histories of where the students made it happen."

The artists also reached out to current CSULB students involved with F.U.E.L. and The Dream Success Center to find out what they wanted to be depicted in the mural. An in-person meeting along with several surveys allowed students to request additions and themes to the painting.

Students requested the inclusion of an LGBTQ flag to represent queer students, the history of undocumented students at CSULB being incorporated and of course, the use of Salgado's ultra-bright, complimenting colors to represent the various communities affected by immigration.

"I used a lot of color and I did that on purpose because when we think of quote-unquote immigrant art, we think of sadness, we think of victims, we think of the bad moments, which is real," Salgado said. "As undocumented immigrants as People who have migrated, it's not pretty and pink all the time, it's tough and I've experienced that. But as an artist, I wanted to also make sure to capture the joy of being an immigrant."


