Order up: Long Beach residents may soon be able to sell home-cooked food to the masses

If you've ever bought tamales from a friend of a friend, or paid for someone to meal prep a week's worth of healthy dinners, chances are you were supporting a microenterprise home kitchen and didn't even know it.

These informal food operations have been thriving through word of mouth for decades, and social media has only helped entrepreneurs spread the word about their homemade businesses.

Multiple counties and cities across California have begun legally recognizing these businesses by granting them licenses and permits, and Long Beach is studying the possibility of doing the same.

Local food advocacy organization Long Beach Fresh has been pushing since 2019 for Long Beach to join the movement and create a legal pathway for these in-home food shops, otherwise known as Microenterprise Home Kitchen Operations (MEHKO).

This falls in line with the work LB Fresh has been doing for years, as the non-profit is largely focused on helping communities gain access to fresh food options through self-reliant means.

"We want to see a diverse and representative local food system where there's a lot of innovation and more representation of diverse cultures and culinary styles," said Tony Damico, co-director of Long Beach Fresh. "Even businesses that can cater to small audiences for people who have very specific dietary constraints. So the benefits are plentiful."

What is a MEHKO?

Currently, Long Beach residents are allowed to sell certain items like bread, baked goods or candies out of their home, at farmers markets or even through a restaurant. These are known as Cottage Food Operations, where people can sell shelf-stable items that they make at home (with a permit).

California passed the Homemade Food Act to allow these operations in 2013, and Long Beach has seen several successful sellers come from this, such as Long Beach's Hey Brother Baker.

A MEHKO permit broadens the types of foods someone can sell from their home to perishable items that include dairy products, such as tamales, soups, meats and veggies. California created the framework for these permits by passing Assembly Bill 626 in 2018, and in 2019 cities were allowed to opt into MEHKO permit programs.

Suddenly, many of these cities became acquainted with the COOK Alliance, an organization aimed at helping governments and health departments pave the way for their MEHKO programs. COOK Alliance has been helping microenterprise kitchen

MLK Jr. Park Vision Plan gets LB city council approval, moves into next phase

After many years and several community meetings, the Long Beach City Council reviewed and approved the \$9.6 million Martin Luther King Jr. Park Vision Plan Tuesday night.

The community around MLK Park in Central Long Beach has gathered at the park since the 1960s for religious, cultural and neighborhood events. The park has helped to create a sense of connection in an area that historically suffered from redlining practices and race-based deed restrictions, resulting in under-investment.

"This park means a lot to a lot of us. My mother grew up going to this park, my dad immigrated to America in

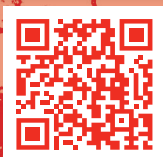

Long Beach Airport's Festival of Flight landing this weekend

Thousands of residents are expected to cruise into the Long Beach Airport (LGB) for its annual Festival of Flight this Saturday.

The beloved free flight-focused event features aircraft displays, live music performances, beer and food trucks, activities for children and helicopter rides for purchase. Performances include sets by The Satin Dollz, DJ Dennis and AbSOULute.

The lineup of aircrafts is expected to include:

- A KC-46 Pegasus, an air-to-air military refueling aircraft.
- The Flabob Express DC-3, built in 1943 and has a storied history that includes flying Winston Churchill and the Royal Family.
- A modified Lockheed L-1011 TriStar that is the only L-1011 still operational.

The Condor Squadron will also conduct two flyovers. All aircraft displays are sponsored by the Port of Long Beach and subject to change.

"Festival of Flight is an all-encompassing showcase of our historic Airport and our City's unique

spirit," said Fourth District Councilman Daryl Supernaw in a public statement. "This festival is a beloved tradition for many families, and I'm so proud that our community has the opportunity to gather on the airfield at LGB in such a meaningful way."

Festival of Flight began in 2013 to celebrate the airport's 90th anniversary. This year's Festival of Flight will double as the closing event of LGB's year-long 100th anniversary celebration, which began on Nov. 26, 2023.

Attendees should bring water, wear sensible shoes and be prepared to be outdoors for hours. Coolers will not be allowed and bags are subject to searches. Service animals are allowed, but pets are not.

Free parking will be available at the corner of East Wardlow Road

and Globemaster Way beginning at 9 a.m. Alternate modes of transportation, such as cycling, carpooling, ridesharing and public transportation, are highly encouraged. Bicycle parking will be available. Overflow parking will be available at 3880 Kilroy Airport Way, with free shuttle service to the event.

"Festival of Flight is a rare chance to walk right onto the airfield and get an up-close look at Long Beach Airport," said Mayor Rex Richardson in a public statement. "This is one of my family's favorite events in Long Beach, and this year is going to be unforgettable as the grand finale of LGB's centennial festivities."

Festival of Flight is free and open to the public, and will take place on Saturday, Oct. 19 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the west end of the airfield at 3590 East Wardlow Road.

STEM EDUCATION

College students can find life under the sea as CELP Scholars at Aquarium of the Pacific

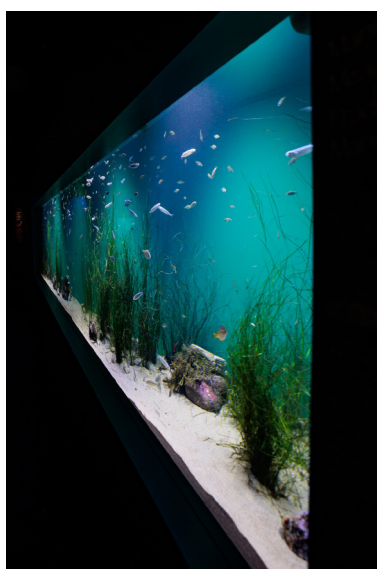

Southern California college students pursuing a career in marine science are encouraged to apply to the Aquarium of the Pacific's Community, Equity, Learning and Persistence (CELP) Scholar Program.

Those who are selected for the program will get to pursue potential STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) career paths by participating in development sessions, meeting professionals in areas of interest and preparing for the Aquarium's 2025 Scholar Symposium.

In addition to exploring career possibilities and connecting with their science-savvy peers, program participants will receive \$10,000 in two incremental installments. Further details about the \$10,000 award will be communicated when students are notified of their program acceptance.

The Aquarium's goal for the CELP Scholar Program is to increase participation in marine sciences, help students find community in STEM and uplift their efforts in the field. Program applications are due by Dec. 1.

"The program is designed to incorporate the Scholars into our Aquarium family," said Jennie Dean, Aquarium of the Pacific vice president of education and conservation, in a public statement. "We

grow together — Scholars get deep access to how our work functions, and the Aquarium benefits from their talents as the Scholars participate in our community-facing programs."

The CELP Scholar Program is open to students enrolled in community college, undergraduate, masters or PhD programs in Southern California. Recipients for this enrollment period will be accepted into the second cohort of the program.

Students who identify as a member of historically underrepresented groups within STEM fields are heavily encouraged to apply, as the Aquarium pushes for a more inclusive workforce.

The second cohort CELP Scholars are on track to be notified on January 20, 2025 and publicly announced on March 15, 2025. Students must be enrolled through December 2025 and commit to be an active program participant to qualify.

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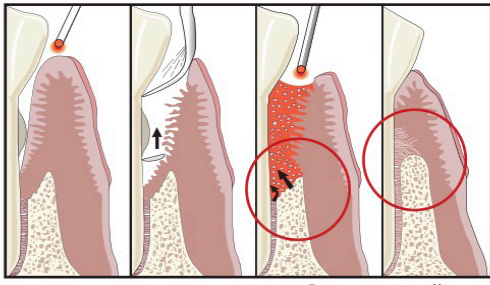

owners since before there was a legal framework or even a name for them, and the organization was integral in the passage of AB 626.

“As you can imagine there was a lot of skepticism, but our organization worked really hard to get public health on board,” said Lauren Wolfer, outreach and advocacy director with COOK Alliance.

Since 2019, over a dozen counties have opted in, including Riverside, Alameda, San Mateo, Santa Barbara, San Diego, Solano, Imperial, Lake, Sierra and most recently, Los Angeles. Since Long Beach has its own health department, they are not included in LA County’s MEHKO program set to begin in November.

Long Beach doesn’t have to participate in the MEHKO program, unlike the street vendor bills that California passed in 2019, which required counties and cities to create laws and regulations for street vending.

“I think people have been asking for this in Long Beach since it was enacted, and we’ve had it for five years now and it’s been a really successful program,” Wolfer said. “It’s kind of like, ‘Okay, we get you

didn’t want to go first, but others have gone first and it’s going really well.”

AB 626 already comes with regulations surrounding MEHKOs, such as:

- Businesses can only have one full-time equivalent employee, not including family members or household members.
- Operators need a Certified Food Protection Manager certificate.
- Anyone involved in the business must have a Food Handler Card Certificate.
- Food needs to be prepared, cooked and served or delivered on the same day it is made.
- Businesses can sell no more than 30 meals per day or 90 meals per week, with a total revenue of \$100,000 annually.
- Reselling food to other facilities is not allowed.
- Businesses may not use third-party delivery apps like Uber Eats, except as provided in the California Health & Safety Code.
- Businesses may not serve alcohol or food that contains alcohol without an appropriate license.
- Businesses are not authorized to run a catering business.

Why The Push For MEHKOs?

Long Beach Fresh has been advocating for a local MEHKO program since 2019, and recently created the Home Cook Coalition in August to educate the public and garner support.

Since the creation of the coalition, they’ve had multiple meetings and have drafted a letter to the City Council and Mayor Rex Richardson urging them to consider the benefits of a MEHKO program.

“We knew it was something that would work really well in Long

Beach,” Damico said. “We knew it would take a little continued effort because it’s state policy that counties and cities can opt into.”

Benefits listed in the letter include creating fresher food options within neighborhoods, removing the expensive need for a commercial kitchen, increasing economic opportunity for residents, and providing regulations for an otherwise unregulated food economy.

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ELECTION

Four candidates run for three seats on Signal Hill City Council

Four candidates are vying for three open seats on the Signal Hill City Council in the upcoming November election.

Signal Hill uses an at-large voting system, so all four candidates will appear on the ballots of Signal Hill residents, who will then choose which three they want to elect. The three candidates who each receive the most votes will be elected and serve a four-year term. The other two councilmembers, Tina Hansen and Keir Jones, were elected in 2022, and still have two years left in office.

Two incumbents, Robert Copeland and Lori Woods, are running to retain their seats on the city council. The third seat is currently held by Edward Wilson, who plans to retire from the council after this term ends.

There will also be an election for Signal Hill City Clerk, but the only candidate running is the current city clerk, Daritza Gonzalez.

The graphic provides a breakdown of the political experience, statements submitted and donors for each candidate in an effort to provide unbiased information that Signal Hill residents can use to make their decision.

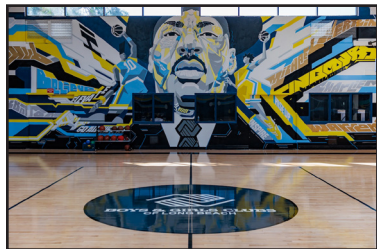

1985 and he met my mom at LBCC across the street, and they spent a lot of time there together,” said Senay Kenfe, sixth district resident. “I grew up there eating the free lunches and for a lot of us, it felt like we’d been forgotten in the city, and so it’s great to have 47 pages of the City saying we’re going to reinvest and rise up.”

Residents have been very vocal in their wishes for the park in the community meetings and workshops, reminiscing on the talent shows, thriving garden and sports leagues that once graced MLK Park. The park is almost nine acres and currently has a recently revived Community Peace Garden, a playground, soccer field, two baseball fields, picnic area, Central Health Facility, Community Center, restrooms, concession stand, indoor pool and Boys and Girls Club building.

Major themes of improvement that came from the workshops included:

- Expanding programming to wider age groups with focuses like science, technology, engineering, arts and math through amenities like a makerspace, computer lab, art studio and classrooms. There were also many requests to have events that are family-oriented and recurring.

- Designing the park so it has spaces to hold large events while still catering to everyday use, so it's a resource and cultural hub for future generations.

- Amenities such as basketball courts, a running loop, exercise equipment, a performance space, a flexible sports field and a cultural trail that has artwork along the pathway that expresses local Black

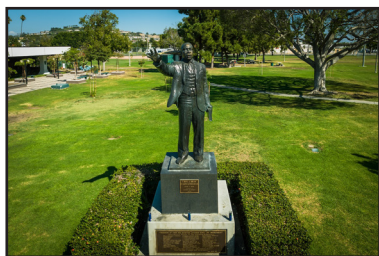
history and culture.

- Making the park safer with additional lighting and programming to have more visitors engaging with the park positively.

Mockups of the park included a plaza area where the statue of Martin Luther King, Jr. would be moved so he's in the center of the park rather than his current spot overlooking the parking lot. The plaza would also hold a performance space, multiple walkways and entry areas.

Short Term Improvements

The creation of a Friends of King Park is one of the immediate next steps, as Brent Dennis, director of Parks, Recreation and Marine, said several community leaders expressed an interest and ability to do so during the planning phase. Other next steps include creating a deferred maintenance program, so the community is able to maintain the park's amenities rather than outsourcing it to the City, and pursuing grant funding.

Parking will soon be reconfigured at the park so it's not taking up green space, leaving more room for new buildings and the plaza area. Increased pathways through the park such as a walking trail looping the park along with ADA entrances and paths are the main focus for accessibility.

The annual Beach Streets event invites residents to put the car keys away while exploring nearby neighborhoods, supporting local businesses and learning more about sustainable transportation. Beach Streets has typically been held in May and first occurred in 2015, with previous locations including Downtown, Bixby Knolls, Cambodia Town and the Wrigley neighborhood.

During Beach Streets Uptown, participants can bike and walk within a safe environment as they explore car-free commuting, while also celebrating Long Beach's community of veterans and active service members.

The route for Beach Streets Uptown will run in the following areas:

- Atlantic Avenue from South Street to Artesia Boulevard
- Artesia Boulevard from Atlantic Avenue to Cherry Avenue

There will be entertainment hubs along the route at Houghton Park (6301 Myrtle Ave.), by the Michelle Obama Neighborhood Library (5870 Atlantic Ave.), and at the corner of Artesia Boulevard and Cher-

ry Avenue, which will serve as the main hub of Beach Streets Uptown.

The event's welcome ceremony will begin at 12:30 p.m., taking place at the main stage of the Artesia Boulevard Hub, with a focus on the improvements made to Artesia Boulevard.

There will be live music and resource booths at both the Artesia Boulevard and library hubs.

Construction on the Artesia Great Boulevard Project started in February 2023 and is on track to finish before the end of the year.

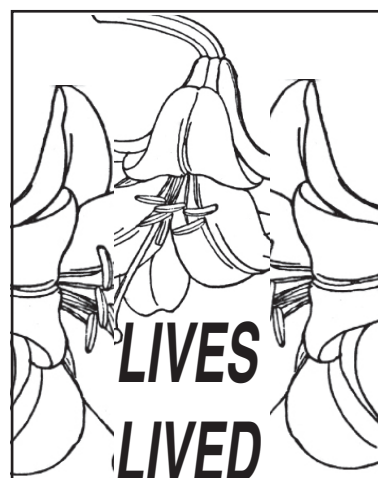

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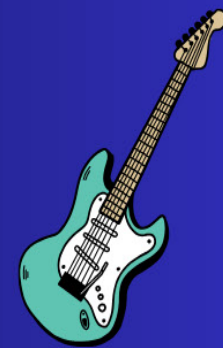
