Amidst SoCal immigration raids, local orgs urge Long Beach to step up protections

Mayor Rex Richardson said that further Justice Fund money will have to follow the regular budget cycle, meaning funds won't be allocated until September. Immigration activists are asking for immediate action.

Long Beach's immigration rights organization and rapid response network ÓRALE (Organizing Rooted in Abolition, Liberation & Empowerment) is once again asking the City to increase funding and protections for Long Beach's immigrant population amidst raids in Southern California.

ÓRALE, which works to support immigrants in order to thrive in society through social justice programs, legal aid and political advocacy, has been asking the City to allocate long term, structural funds to the Justice Fund for years. This fund provides free legal representation to Long Beach immigrants facing deportation.

The Justice Fund is also used by the Filipino Migrant Center and the United Cambodian Community of Long Beach, mainly to help pay for immigrant defense legal services.

Along with removal defense, the Justice Fund provides funding towards:

- Affirmative applications for people who are not in removal proceedings, but seeking immigration protections including but not limited to U-Visas, T-Visas, and Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) petitions.
- Appellate removal defense, such as filing Motions to Reopen and Ninth Circuit Appeals for cases in which an immigration judge orders a person to be deported.
- Community outreach, education and referrals to the Justice Fund.

ÓRALE hosted a Justice Fund rally on Tuesday night in front of City Hall during the city council meeting to advocate for a \$2.2 million allocation to the Justice Fund. Local organizations Filipino Migrant Center, Long

As the immigrant community is suffering, many residents may be feeling overwhelmed and wondering how they can help. In a city of over 100,000 immigrants, several of Long Beach's local businesses have stepped in to raise funds for organizations providing legal aid or helping impacted families more directly.

The *Signal Tribune* compiled this list of businesses fundraising for the local immigrant community, and will continue updating this list until resources are no longer needed.

The organization also helps people locate loved ones who they can't find within the jail system, visits people detained to show support and keeps track of cases.

Amidst the ongoing Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) raids, local organizations are creating independent networks to help each other. Any resident can volunteer with these networks or help by donating to them, spreading reliable resources or urging the local government to take actions to help the immigrant community.

In Long Beach, all forms of action are taking place. Organizations like ÓRALE, the Filipino Migrant Center and the United Cambodian Community of Long Beach are all urging the city council to allocate \$2.2 million to the Justice Fund. While holding rallies and educating people on the Justice Fund, these organizations have also created their own Rapid Response Networks.

What is a Rapid Response Network?

Rapid Response Networks are made up of residents and local organizations with the goal of protecting and defending the local immigrant community.

Some Rapid Response Networks have been around for decades, like Los Angeles', led by the Coalition for Humane Immigrant Rights (CHIRLA) and founded in 2006 in response to mass raids in factories and textile centers. Long Beach's are newer and still growing, meaning they need more support and volunteers.

Currently, these networks are being used to verify reports of ICE sightings in Long Beach, and to educate local immigrants of their constitutional rights in case they are stopped by ICE agents in public or if an ICE agent knocks on their door at home.

Residents who are not part of a Rapid Response Network can still help by saving the phone numbers and calling to report ICE sightings or arrests in the city. Long Beach has two Rapid Response Networks through immigrant rights organizations: ÓRALE and the Filipino Migrant Center.

Long Beach's Rapid Response Networks

ÓRALE's Rapid Response

Network: 562-245-9575

Volunteers in this network are first responders for local ICE activity. This may mean driving to a location reported by a resident and helping connect people who are de-

tained or their families to crucial resources.

Residents must live in Long Beach and be able to commit to specific timeframes. Volunteers will be required to attend training. ÓRALE asks that volunteers for this network are U.S. citizens, for their own safety. Being bilingual is not required, but it is a plus.

This resource brings people together to share resources and skills that help Long Beach's migrant community to protect each other and combat anti-immigrant policies. People are invited to offer legal consultations, join their rapid response network or conduct door-to-door Know Your Rights education in their communities.

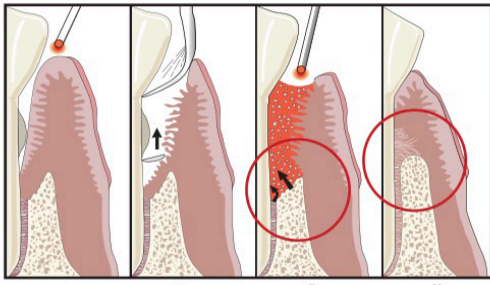

Long Beach youth can receive free lunch during summer break at 24 local locations

Long Beach youth ages 1-18 can receive free, nutritious meals through the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Summer Food Service Program from June 16 through Aug. 22 at two dozen locations in Long Beach and Signal Hill.

During the program, Long Beach Parks, Recreation and Marine staff will distribute free meals at 22 local parks for children and youth Monday through Friday. Meals will also be served at Bret Harte and Brewitt Neighborhood Libraries Tuesday through Friday from June 17 through Aug. 8. No lunches will be served on Thursday, June 19 and Friday, July 4.

Beach Tenants, Long Beach Residents Empowered, the Youth Leadership Institute and more were there in support, some speaking to the importance of the Justice Fund. More than 1,000 residents gathered for the rally, then marched through downtown in a peaceful demonstration.

Richardson acknowledged the rally during the city council meeting, saying that additional funds would have to be part of the City's "regular budget cycle," which begins in August. He said those funds would be allocated before Oct. 1.

He added that the City will experience Immigrations and Custom Enforcement (ICE) "activities" for the next 30-60 days, or "who knows how long," and prompted people to support ÓRALE. The organization posted its response on social media channels Wednesday, demanding "concrete commitment" and saying that the fund has already been hindered by "administrative delays."

"If Mayor Richardson and the council members fail to commit to this investment now, the Long Beach community will be at every single council meeting until city leadership recognizes that the Justice Fund is critical for the wellbeing and safety of immigrants in our city. We will not accept delays until September. We need a commitment to \$2.2 million from Mayor

Rex Richardson and the City Council today," ÓRALE's statement concluded.

Roughly 1/4 of Long Beach residents, or around 111,000 people, are immigrants, according to the U.S. Census. Around 54,000 of these people are undocumented, according to a March 2025 study from the Vera Institute of Justice. That same study estimates that Long Beach immigrants make up 28% of the city's labor force, and roughly 7,000 immigrants are entrepreneurs in Long Beach.

The Filipino Migrant Center, which serves Filipino immigrants in Long Beach and is part of the Justice Fund Coalition, also posted a message on social media calling for the City to further invest in the

Justice Fund.

ICE has been conducting raids throughout Southern California since Friday, June 6. Long Beach's neighboring cities have seen many reports of ICE detaining people, including in Downey, Whittier, Paramount, and further east in Santa Ana.

In response to the raids, protests have been organized throughout the country, in San Antonio, New York City, Seattle, San Francisco, Boston and more cities. The Los Angeles protests began on Friday and have continued every day since, even after Mayor Karen Bass enacted a citywide curfew of 8 p.m.

Mayor Rex Richardson posted his response to the Los Angeles raids on social media on Friday evening, writing, "... Officers arrive without warning while masked and without identification, leaving just as quickly. These raids instill fear in residents, communities, and profoundly damage public trust. We are in contact with local immigrant rights organizations and stand ready to support our immigrant communities."

The organization posted a message on its social media channels on Friday night when protests began in Los Angeles. They urged the City to take action, saying, "Mayor Richardson's response to today's ICE raids shows he understands

the fear ICE is purposely instilling in immigrant communities. But Long Beach needs more than awareness. We need ACTION ... The raids happened in LA today. They could happen in Long Beach tomorrow. Every day that goes by,

the need grows more urgent."

"The question isn't whether ICE will come to Long Beach. The question is: Will our city be ready to stand up for immigrant families when they do," ÓRALE's said in a public statement on June 6.

Hundreds of Long Beach residents gathered for a rally on Sunday, June 8 opposing the ongoing Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) raids sweeping Southern California.

As the national guard, called in by President Donald Trump, began to arrive in Los Angeles on Sunday morning, Long Beach residents marched down Broadway and Ocean Boulevard chanting and holding signs opposing the immigration raids.

The raids began in Los Angeles the morning of Friday, June 6, resulting in the arrest of 118 people, as reported by the LAist, followed by protests throughout the city. As of June 12, the detainees are still being held in the Los Angeles Detention Center and there have been daily protests against the raids.

Since June 6, ICE has moved into the surrounding cities of Whittier, Paramount, Santa Ana, Culver City and more.

The rally was organized by Long Beach resident Tanya Kapila, who said, "It's been really devastating. I know a lot of undocumented folks, I know we all do especially in Long Beach. I know a lot of them want to

mobilize and organize themselves and they don't have the ability to."

Kapila organized a rally in November 2024 for the liberation of Palestinian people, and spoke about how these struggles are connected.

"Look at the human aspect of it. It's less about borders and it's against that mindset that we were taught, this individualistic mindset that colonization has brought us," Kapila said. "It's more about the human race and the world's people rather than Palestinian people, Muslim people, Mexican people ... When one person is oppressed we are all oppressed."

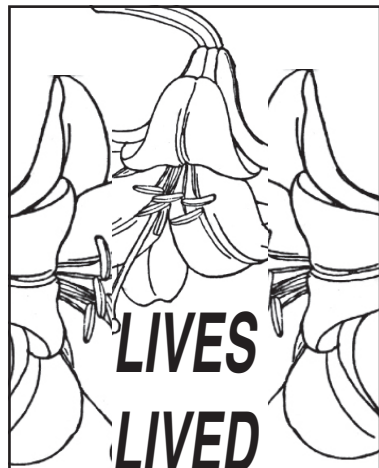

Other than that, give her a sunny spot near a window and a comfy bed for her aged bones. Fudge looks a little rough thanks to her previous live before Long Beach Animal Care Services took her in. She's nearly toothless and is on kidney care food and pain meds for arthritis, but so far, she needs no further care except for her lovely heart and soul. No precious animal should spend their final days in a shelter, so if you can offer Fudge hospice, email PetAdopt@longbeach.gov to speed the process, or call (562) 570-7387. Better yet, meet them in person at Long Beach Animal Care Services, 7700 E. Spring St., Long Beach, at entrance to El Dorado Park (no parking fee for shelter visitors). Visiting hours are Wednesday-Friday, 10 a.m.-5:30 p.m., and Saturday-Sunday, 10 a.m.-4 p.m. Thanks to cat volunteer Susan for championing Fudge and writing her story.

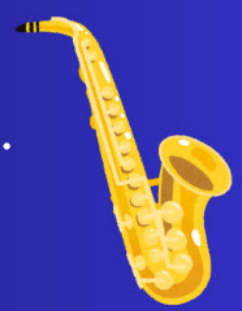
