Long Beach Transit will allow ICE to enter buses and other workplaces

On Wednesday, June 25, Long Beach Transit employees received a letter from the company instructing them what to do if Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agents attempt to enter their workplaces, including restricted areas and public buses.

Employees were told in the letter they "must not attempt to block or disrupt" ICE's actions, comparing the policy to "interactions with any law enforcement agency."

As of July 1, Long Beach Transit said they have not detected any ICE activity within its system. The company confirmed with the *Signal Tribune* that the letter was sent out to employees as part of its standard operating procedures to ensure "full compliance with all applicable laws."

According to a Long Beach Transit media representative, employees are not directed to verify that the person is law enforcement before they enter public transit. Instead, Transit Police will verify they are law enforcement and the "nature of the activity" once they arrive.

"It's just unacceptable to say that it's not the duty of their staff to verify any of that, and that they're not allowed to disrupt. What we're seeing is a huge health issue, by folks being kidnapped in the street. So how that message comes across to our community is, 'Don't ride our buses. You're not safe here,'" said Gaby Hernandez, executive director of Organizing Rooted in Abolition, Liberation and Empowerment (ÓRALE).

ÓRALE is advising residents to no longer use public transportation in Long Beach due to the ongoing safety issue, Hernandez told the *Signal Tribune*.

"We know that has a huge impact on people getting to school, people getting to work ... It's a huge challenge for peo-

How to apply for cheaper internet in Long Beach

Low-income Long Beach residents can now apply for cheaper internet services through the Internet Service Enrollment Line.

The enrollment line is powered by the California Emerging Technology Fund (CETF), which focuses on fostering public policy concerning the digital divide. Residents can call the hotline at 844-321-4472 between 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Mondays through Fridays and from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. on weekends.

State Senator Lena Gonzalez supports resolution to denounce federal immigration raids

As outrage mounts over federal immigration raids across California, members of the state legislature gathered at the Capitol on Thursday to urge the state to formally condemn federal raids targeting immigrant communities.

The Latino Legislative Caucus for the California State Senate held a press conference on Thursday in Sacramento in support of Senate Joint Resolution 9 (SJR9), which if passed would mean the state senate would officially denounce the federal immigration raids. Among the caucus members who spoke was caucus chair and Long Beach's State Senator Lena Gonzalez.

Along with directing the state legislature to officially denounce recent mass immigration raids and the use of military force in immigration enforcement, if passed, SJR 9 would also call for expanded legal aid and emergency resources for immigrant communities.

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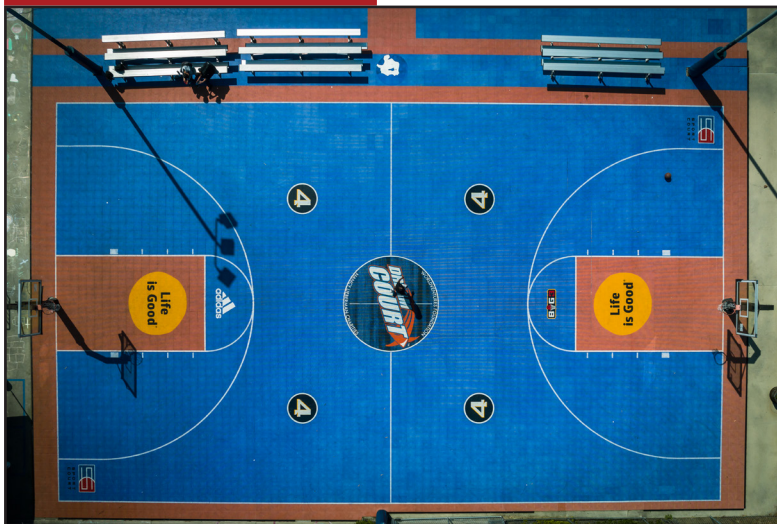

CSULB guard Lauren Cummings to host Girls Be Ballers 2 camp on July 19

Long Beach State sophomore basketball player Lauren Cummings is hosting a free basketball camp for girls grades 1-6 at the Salvation Army Gym in Long Beach on July 19.

Through her nonprofit Lauren Cummings (LC) Elite Basketball, Girls Be Ballers 2 aims to spark the next generation of female athletes. Cummings is looking to mentor and advocate for young women pursuing sports, allowing them to gain confidence, leadership and teamwork skills.

"I want every girl to know she's capable of greatness," Cummings said in a public statement. "This camp is about showing them they belong—on the court, in leadership, and in life."

Before playing as a guard for Cal State Long Beach, Cummings was a multi-sport high school athlete in Billings, Montana, becoming the first female to play quarterback at an AA school in Montana and the first female to play American Legion Baseball in the state. Cummings returned to her hometown for a successful camp in June and

now will be taking her camp to Long Beach.

The Long Beach camp will be split into sessions for girls grades 1-3 from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. and grades 4-6 from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m., with each session limited to 40 girls. The camp will include high-energy drills and skill-building activities within an inspirational program, with a focus on mental health awareness and instilling confidence.

Cummings is covering the \$3,000 cost of Girls Be Ballers 2 through her Name, Image, and Likeness (NIL) deals and community partnerships with Southland Credit Union, Legends Sports Bar, Raising Canes, Movita and Naples Ribs. Donations from community and local businesses to LC Elite Basketball help ensure more camps can be organized in the future.

"Every girl deserves the chance to dribble, shoot, and dream big," Cummings said in a public statement. "This camp is my way of opening that door."

Reach for the stars through Space Beach Camp; applications open through July 7

The Long Beach Economic Development Department is taking flight on the second annual Space Beach Youth Workforce Summer Camp, which will run from July 14-25.

Space Beach Camp grants 45 local youth ages 16 to 24 to explore aerospace career possibilities while promoting workforce equity in the field of science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). Applications for participants are open online through Monday, July 7.

The Economic Development Department is actively searching for aerospace employers and educational institutions to host program activities.

"Our young people are the future of Space Beach, and this camp provides participants with an exciting opportunity to explore career pathways in the transformative aerospace industry here in Long Beach," said Mayor Rex Richardson in a public statement. "We are proud to partner with our aerospace and educational partners to offer this inclusive and dynamic program for young adults in our city."

According to the Economic Development Department webpage, Space Beach Camp will offer the following experiences over the course of the two-week program:

•**Interactive learning:** Dive into hands-on activities and a dynamic curriculum.

•**Meet the experts:** Engage with engineers, entrepreneurs and tech professionals.

•**Exclusive tours:** Go behind the scenes at aerospace companies

and top training facilities.

•**Career insights:** Attend panel discussions and receive mentorship.

•**Networking events:** Build connections through industry meet-ups and interactive workshops.

The camp operates under the direction of the Economic Development Department's Long Beach Workforce Innovation Network (LBWIN) Youth Career Services Center and is recommended for youth who have displayed interest or potential in STEM. Participants will receive an hourly rate of \$18 for approximately 50 hours and transportation assistance will also be available.

"We're excited to launch the second Space Beach Camp, designed to ignite inspiration, provide stability and expand opportunity for our young residents of Long Beach,"

said Economic Development Director Bo Martinez in a public statement. "Thanks to the leadership of Mayor Rex Richardson, the City Council, our incredible industry partners and dedicated LBWIN team, this program continues to grow. Together, we're empowering the next generation and shaping the future of Long Beach's aerospace workforce."

Space Beach Camp is funded by a one-time allocation of \$300,000 approved by Long Beach City Council for the adopted Fiscal Year 2024 Budget. These funds also support paid public service internships as part of the Long Beach Public Service Corps Program.

ple, and it shouldn't be,” Hernandez said. “We shouldn't have to be in this position. People should be able to freely ride the buses, people should be able to be in bus stops and this administration is terrifying our communities so much that daily activities are not being conducted anymore because people are afraid of leaving their homes.”

The letter was sent from Long Beach Transit President and Chief Executive Officer Kenneth McDonald, beginning, “In light of recent events across the Los Angeles region, we recognize that this is a challenging time for many, including our employees. While these continuing developments may affect individuals differently, our role as public servants remains clear and steadfast.”

The letter goes on to provide “operational instructions” for if ICE attempts to enter buses, the Transit Visitor Information Center or corporate offices. Employees are directed to call their department supervisor and the Transit Service Delivery dispatch. Long Beach Transit will then contact their System Security Manager Billy Anderson, according to the letter.

A Long Beach Transit media representative told the *Signal Tribune* that the dispatch team will contact the Transit Police, who is contracted by the Long Beach Police Department.

Hernandez has been with ÓRALE for years and said this policy from Long Beach Transit is indicative of how Long Beach leadership has treated the City's sanctuary policies. Even with the passage of the Long Beach Values Act, she said the nonprofit is “always pushing for that to be respected.”

The Long Beach Values Act means that the City will not collaborate with or aid ICE, or give out sensitive information to the agency. Hernandez said she was told the City can't step in unless there's a public safety concern.

“So my question was, ‘What is a public safety concern?’ The public safety concern to me is people being kidnapped in the street. And in their eyes they may not see it that way, which is unacceptable,” Hernandez said. “We should have leadership strong enough to say, ‘We will not allow this to happen in our city. We will not allow our people to be kidnapped.’”

The *Signal Tribune* received this statement from Long Beach Transit regarding the letter, “Our highest priority is the safety of our employees and customers, and serving the diverse and vibrant communities in our service area ... The memorandum was focused on providing LBT employees with resources about what to do should they encounter any challenges with law enforcement onboard a bus or at a facility.”

At least a dozen Long Beach residents have been taken by ICE in the last month, Hernandez said. ÓRALE is going off of the number of people who reach out to them for legal defense assistance, so the actual number of people taken by ICE may be higher.

According to ABC7, 722 people were arrested by ICE in the Los Angeles County area in the first 10 days of June. Six people were taken by ICE from a Home Depot parking lot and Hilltop Park in Signal Hill on June 26.

Long Beach's Justice Fund provides free legal aid to immigrants facing deportation through several nonprofits. Since January, ÓRALE, the United Cambodian Community and the Filipino Migrant Center have been asking the City to allocate another \$2.2 million to the fund, more than doubling its current budget.

On June 10, hundreds of community members rallied for this increase in front of Long Beach City Hall. Inside the building, Mayor Rex Richardson said during a council meeting that any increased funding would have to follow the “regular budget cycle.”

“While I understand that the final product happens at the end of August, we still need an allocation now,” Hernandez said, adding that City leadership could promise that money ahead of time.

Long Beach will host seven events in the 2028 Paralympic Games

Long Beach will host seven sporting events in the 2028 Paralympic Games, the Los Angeles Organizing Committee announced Tuesday, June 3.

“We are incredibly proud and honored that Long Beach will host seven Paralympic sporting events for the 2028 Los Angeles Paralympic Games,” said Mayor Rex Richardson in a public statement. “This milestone truly showcases our commitment to inclusion, athletic excellence and community spirit. We can't wait to celebrate the incredible talents and inspiring stories of Paralympic athletes right here in our beautiful coastal city.”

The seven Paralympic sporting events to take place in Long Beach are:

- Para Climbing
- Para Swimming
- Shooting Para Sport
- Sitting Volleyball
- Blind Football
- Para Rowing
- Para Canoe-Sprint

The City of Long Beach, a 2028 Venue City, will also stage 11 sporting events for the 2028 Olympic Games.

The 2028 Games will mark the Paralympic debut of Para Climbing, set to take place in the Convention Center Lot alongside Para Swimming, which will be held at the adjacent temporary outdoor aquatics center.

Within the Convention Center, Shooting Para Sport will take place in a purpose-built, temporary indoor range where spectators can witness the ultimate test of accuracy and control. Adjacent to the Convention Center, the Long Beach Arena will stage Sitting Volleyball.

Blind Football will take place at Alamitos Beach in the temporary arena where Olympic Beach Volleyball will be held, following the suc-

cessful model of Olympic-Paralympic venue sharing from previous Games to maximize the use of the temporary arena. Also announced are Para Rowing and Para Canoe-Sprint events being held at Long Beach's Marine Stadium.

With these additions, Long Beach is now confirmed to stage 18 sporting events across seven venues citywide for the 2028 Olympic and Paralympic Games. The Olympic sporting events already confirmed are:

- Beach Volleyball at Alamitos Beach
- Coastal Rowing and Marathon Swimming along the Waterfront
- Sport Climbing and Water Polo at the Convention Center Lot
- Target Shooting and Artistic Swimming at the Convention Center
- Handball at Long Beach Arena
- Canoe-Sprint and Rowing at Marine Stadium
- Sailing in the waters along Belmont Shore

Hosted by the City of Los Angeles, the 2028 Olympic Games will take place July 14 through July 30, 2028, and the 2028 Paralympic Games will take place Aug. 15 through Aug. 27, 2028.

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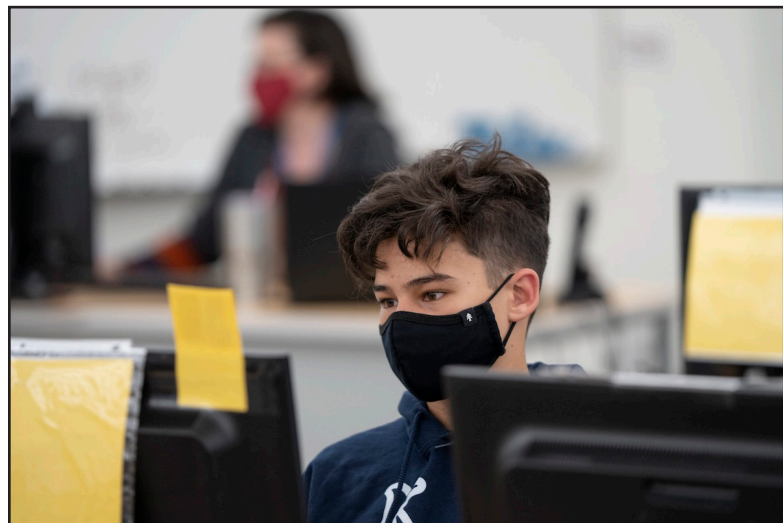

Eligibility for low-cost internet services for Long Beach residents is dependent upon enrollment in at least one of the following programs: CalFresh, Lifeline, Medi-Cal or Supplemental Security (SSI), NSLP (Free or Reduced School Lunch Program) and/or Pell Grant.

Representatives are available to help in English, Spanish, Khmer and Tagalog. Voicemail assistance is available 24 hours a day, including holidays.

The Internet Service Enrollment Line is staffed by digital inclusion navigators who will assist callers from start to finish with their low-cost internet service, according to a statement from the City. The CETF is a nonprofit that was created through a condition of the AT&T and Verizon merger in 2005.

The California Public Utilities Commission approved the merger on the condition that the two companies contributed \$60 million into a nonprofit with the goal of increasing internet access to underserved

communities. The companies currently contribute \$12 million a year into the fund.

"I am proud of our efforts to bridge the digital divide in Long Beach by continuously expanding the digital resources and services available to residents and the way we serve our community," said Technology and Innovation Department Director Lea Eriksen in a public statement.

Low-cost internet plan options depend on a person's eligibility and the available offers from the local internet service provider in the area, according to Long Beach's Technology and Innovation Department (TID). There is no cut-off time to apply for this service.

This service is available to all California residents. Learn more at internetforallnow.org/. The hotline number 844-321-4472 is specific to Long Beach residents, the TID told the *Signal Tribune*, allowing the City to gather data on the program.

"On the eve of this Independence Day, when we all take the Pledge of Allegiance inside the Capitol and we say, 'With liberty and justice for all,' we can't help but think, 'Liberty and justice for who?' Gonzalez said during the press conference. "We're standing here today as immigrants, daughters, sons, family members, neighbors; we're here to say loud and clear these cruel and immoral raids don't just hurt immigrants. They hurt our entire communities. We are all absolutely and personally shaken to the core."

During President Donald Trump's presidential campaign, he promised to oversee the largest mass deportation in U.S. history. Trump stated his deportation efforts would focus on criminals, but immigrants with criminal convictions have only made up 30% of ICE arrests since May, according to an analysis of ICE data by *ABC News*.

According to an analysis of ICE data by *NBC News*, since Trump came into office, the number of people arrested by ICE has doubled, and the number of people being held in detention by ICE is higher

than any other point in American history.

Trump stated his deportation efforts would focus on criminals, but immigrants with criminal convictions have only made up 30% of ICE arrests since May, according to an analysis of ICE data by ABC News.

Videos circulated on social media on June 26 showed federal agents detaining and taking people in Signal Hill. Day laborers were reportedly taken by federal agents outside the Home Depot on Cherry Avenue and at least one man was taken from Hilltop Park. The *Signal Tribune* reached out to ICE to confirm how many arrests were made in Signal Hill, but did not receive a response.

According to ICE data obtained by the Cato Institute, of those arrested by ICE from the beginning of fiscal year 2025 to June, 65% had never been convicted of a crime and 93% had never been convicted of a violent crime.

"This is an attack against all of us," said well-known civil rights advocate Dolores Huerta during the press conference. "We know that the people they have been detaining are the people who feed us, our farmworkers, the people that work in the packing sheds, the people that clean our hotels, the people who do all of the work to keep America fed, clean and safe."

Representatives from the LGBTQ, Jewish, Asian and Black Legislative Caucuses attended the press conference and gave state-

ments in support of the Latino and immigrant communities.

"We must know that we cannot allow this racial terror—and that is exactly what this is— we cannot allow this racial terror to persist and continue," said State Senator Lola Smallwood-Cuevas of the Black Legislative Caucus. "We will resist. We will contest. We will denounce these actions with every fiber of our being. Why? Because our humanity depends on it. Why? Because our economy depends on it. Why? Because our safety depends on it. [...] The Legislative Black Caucus stands in solidarity with our immigrant brothers and sisters, with our families. We know the significance and importance of radical solidarity between Black and brown communities, and how we stand together against this racial profiling and reemergence of racial terror, today, tomorrow and always."

Long Beach asks for input through online parks survey

The City of Long Beach is asking residents to share their ideas and priorities for the future of local parks, trails and recreation spaces through an online survey available through Aug. 15.

The survey is part of an effort to update Long Beach's Open Space and Recreation Element (OSR), a section of the General Plan that guides recreation, natural resource preservation and public safety in the city's public green spaces. The update is a joint initiative between the City's Community Development Department and the Department of Parks, Recreation and Marine (PRM).

The updates made to the OSR will focus on making park spaces more inclusive, environmentally sustainable and accessible, in line with the City's current long-term

goals outlined in its Parks Strategic Plan (2022–2032), such as boosting climate resilience, cutting air pollution and protecting outdoor infrastructure.

The survey is available on the City's website in English, Spanish, Khmer, and Tagalog. Residents without home internet can visit any Long Beach Public Library branch to access the survey.

Survey responses will also influence future community events, including focus groups and workshops scheduled for this fall.

The last OSR update took place in 2002. This new version will coordinate with other City planning efforts like the Land Use and Housing Elements as well as the Climate Action Plan to further Long Beach's sustainability goals.

Long Beach to expand organic waste collection this summer

The City of Long Beach is moving forward with the next stage of its organic waste collection program, a citywide effort to reduce landfill waste and align with state climate goals. Beginning this month, households with Monday trash pickup will receive green trash bins for food scraps and yard waste.

Since the program first launched in October 2024, nearly 8,000 households have participated, successfully diverting over 900 tons of organic material from landfills.

The City will continue the rollout through October 2025, gradually giving green bins to all homes served by Long Beach Refuse. Neighborhoods with Tuesday and Wednesday trash pickup areas will get their green bins in August, followed by neighborhoods with Thursday and Friday trash pickups in October.

Informational materials will be mailed in English and Spanish to every household that receives a green bin. Additional language resources in Khmer and Tagalog will be available online and upon request.

Routine checks by City workers will help ensure materials are sorted correctly and identify any contamination issues.

To better match each household's needs, the City has established a process to adjust cart sizes. Residents are asked to try their cart for at least two weeks before requesting a size change. Requests

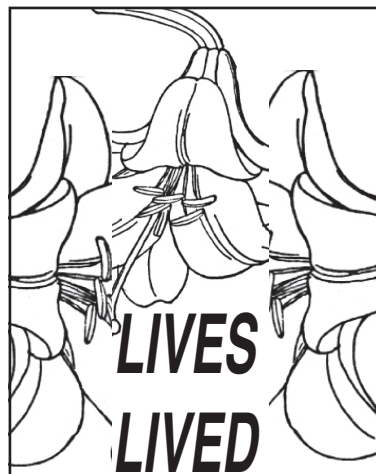

can be submitted at lbcity.info/CartSupport or by calling 562-570-2876. Size adjustments are limited to once every six months, and staff will perform follow-up visits after downsizing to confirm the new cart is working effectively.

The City will also phase out the purple recycling carts and replace them with standardized blue carts to comply with new state color requirements. Details about the recycling cart exchange will be shared in early 2026.

Long Beach began a commercial food scraps collection program in 2021, which expanded citywide by 2023.

In March 2025, the City Council voted to increase solid waste service rates. Residents who have started using their green bins will see their bills go up starting Aug. 1. Those still waiting to receive their green bin will not be billed until service begins. Details on current rates can be found at lbcity.info/CollectionRates.

Belmont Shore and Port of LA confirmed as venue for Olympic sailing events

Sailing events for the upcoming Olympic Games in Los Angeles will take place along the coast of Belmont Shore and the Port of Los Angeles, the Los Angeles Organizing Committee for the 2028 Olympic and Paralympic Games (LA28) announced on June 30.

“Long Beach is the premiere location for windsurfing and kite—two outstanding sailing events that will captivate spectators,” Mayor Rex Richardson said in a public statement. “We hosted Sailing competitions during the 1984 Olympic Games, and we cannot wait to continue our legacy and show our beautiful coastline to the world once again in 2028.”

These locations were chosen because they offer suitable conditions for racing and spectator viewing, according to a statement from the City of Long Beach.

Sailing at the 2028 Games will feature 10 events across men’s,

women’s and co-ed teams. Men and women’s windsurfing and kiteboarding will take place off the coast of Belmont Shore. The other six events will include various styles of boat racing at the Port of Los Angeles.

Long Beach will host the most events outside of Los Angeles, with 11 Olympic and 7 Paralympic competitions scheduled in the city.

The 2028 Olympic Games will take place from July 14–30, and the Paralympic Games will follow from August 15–27.

Long Beach expands LB Circuit micro-transit service

Long Beach is growing its free LB Circuit micro-transit service with more electric vehicles, extended hours and additional routes stretching from Downtown to Alamitos Bay.

The expanded service area now includes Bluff Heights, Bluff Park and the rest of Belmont Heights, along with new stops from the Queen Mary to 10th Street between Atlantic and Magnolia Avenues.

“Long Beach is a leader in building a more connected, accessible and sustainable city through a var-

ied and extensive transportation network,” said Mayor Rex Richardson in a public statement. “This expansion of the LB Circuit is another option that helps people get where they need to go—whether it’s work, school, a medical appointment or a favorite restaurant—without having to rely on a personal car.”

The fleet now totals 14 electric vehicles, including four new SUVs and two new ADA-accessible vans.

“Inclusion and accessibility are at the heart of our LB Circuit program,” said First District Councilmember Mary Zendejas in a public statement. “By expanding the fleet to include ADA-accessible

vans, we’re removing barriers for older adults and residents with disabilities who rely on safe, reliable transportation to maintain independence and stay connected.”

The LB Circuit micro-transit service will also extend service hours to 8 p.m. on Sundays.

LB Circuit, launched citywide in 2022, has provided over 130,000 free rides, helping reduce emissions and ease parking congestion in the city. The service is supported by \$410,000 in grant funding from the South Coast Air Quality Management District, as well as

contributions from the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority Proposition A funding and the City’s 2025 budget.

“Bringing micro-transit to more neighborhoods means our community can benefit from clean, car-free trips to their favorite local spots,” said Second District Councilmember Cindy Allen in a public statement. “Especially in District 2, where we have significant parking challenges, this service is immensely beneficial to residents. Our shuttle serves thousands of passengers every month, and this expansion will help even more residents visit their favorite destinations. I was proud to advocate for the initial expansion to the Retro Row area, and I’m proud to see Long Beach leading the way in making our community even more connected through smart, sustainable transportation options.”

The City plans to continue the LB Circuit program at least until the 2028 Olympic and Paralympic Games, when Long Beach will serve as a host city.

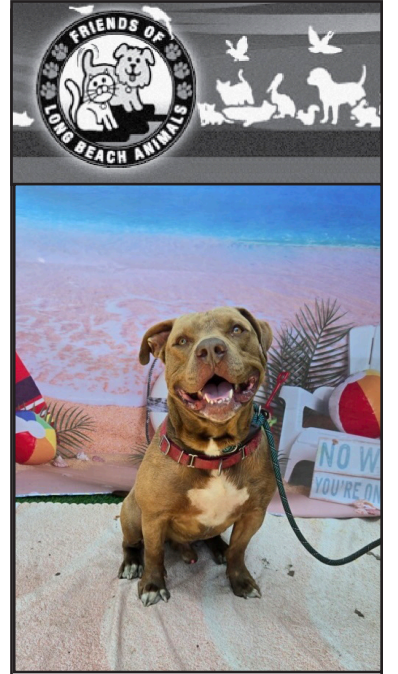

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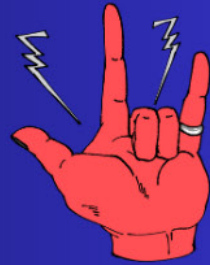
