What happened to Jasmine Thorne?

Long Beach mom disappeared without her phone, wallet, keys or vehicle in 2023, just four days after giving birth; Father of her child murdered the next year.

Four days after giving birth to her new baby, 25-year-old Jasmine Thorne allegedly left her Long Beach home to pick up some taco ingredients for her family on April 8, 2023. Days later, her car was found abandoned just a few blocks away, with her wallet, phone and keys inside.

Over two years later, Thorne still hasn't been seen or heard from since.

Although there hasn't been any prior news articles or publicity about Thorne's disappearance, her household made headlines the following year, when police say her godbrother fatally shot the father of her baby. Thorne had been living with both men as well as her godmother when she went missing.

Her sister, Kadeshia Williams, believes that there's no way Thorne willingly walked away from her children.

"I just want the community to

share my sister's story, to reach the news, for everyone to just see she's been missing this long. I've reached out, I've cried," Williams said. "[...] I just want the community to help me as I would help them if it was their loved one."

How Thorne's birth family found out she was missing

Williams recalled to the *Signal Tribune* the moments after her birth mother discovered that Thorne had disappeared. Their birth mother called her frantically at 3 a.m., repeatedly yelling, "Jasmine's missing" through the phone as a half-asleep and confused Williams tried to comprehend what she was hearing.

Williams eventually learned that not only was her sister missing, but she had been missing for two months at that point, and no one had bothered to alert her birth family.

Williams shared that she and her sister came from a dysfunctional family and grew up in foster care.

As an adult, Thorne moved to Long Beach from the East Coast with her godmother, her godbrother Damon Castro and her partner Jamie Jones. Her godfamily and birth family were tangentially connected through social media, and it was

only through seeing posts on social media that Thorne's birth mother learned she had gone missing.

The concerned sister said she reached out to Thorne's godfamily for answers, but was met with hostility from Castro. She was on

the phone with Thorne's godmother when she says Castro took the phone from his mother and began cursing at her and her family members.

"He was very, very aggravated, very aggressive," Williams told the *Signal Tribune*. "And I'm just trying to figure out, why was he so agitated, aggressive to us? Because if we're supposed to be on the same team, that's supposed to be your godsister, why are you against us? And that's the same one who killed her baby's father a year later."

According to Williams, Thorne's godfamily first said that Thorne had left home on her own to buy some groceries for her family. She said they later changed their story and said a friend had come to pick her up. Williams said she was able to get in contact with this friend, who denied picking up Thorne before she went missing.

According to Williams, although there was allegedly a GPS tracker on Thorne's vehicle, it took Long Beach police a few days to find it a

LB's Community Crisis Responders will now address calls city-wide

In an effort to take a health-based approach to violence prevention, Long Beach announced the expansion of its Community Crisis Response (CCR) team.

The team was formed in 2023 to respond to non-emergency, non-violent and non-medical calls where services are deemed appropriate to help residents, focusing mainly on West Long Beach and Downtown. In the past two years, this five-person team has responded to nearly 900 calls to provide help and connections to local services.

"The expansion of Community Crisis Response reflects the program's proven impact and effec-

tiveness," said Health and Human Services Director Alison King in a public statement. "We're proud to offer community members a compassionate response to crises and are committed to expanding our reach to meet the City's needs."

However, the City is not adding more workers to the expansion of the health-based violence prevention team. Instead, the five-person team that has previously focused on specific areas in Long Beach will now respond to calls for the entire city. The City has no plans to add additional response teams, according to a spokesperson from the Health Department.

Long Beach's CCR team was formed through a mixture of state grants and local funds, using \$516,447 in Measure A funds and

\$400,000 from the City's general fund. Most of the program is funded through a two-year \$1 million grant from the Board of State and Community Corrections' Byrne State Crisis Intervention Program.

The CCR team costs about \$2 million annually to keep running, according to a spokesperson with the Health Department. The grant funding expires in 2026, and the City currently has no confirmed grants to keep the team going.

What Does the Community Crisis Response Team Do?

Community Crisis Response individuals respond to calls-for-service where mental health navigation and resources are deemed the

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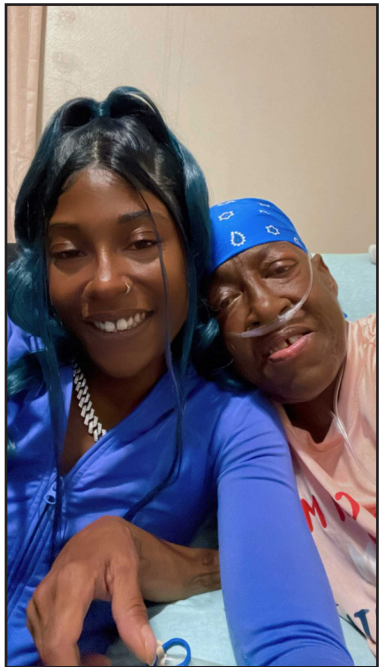
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couple blocks away from her home. All of her personal items were inside the vehicle.

"She didn't have anything — nothing. She didn't take her wallet — no ID, no purse, no phone. Everything was in the vehicle," Williams told the *Signal Tribune*.

They say tragedy comes in threes: Thorne's birth mother passed away last September, still searching for her daughter.

"It was only me and my mom speaking up for my sister," Williams said. "And now that my mom's no longer here, I'm the only voice, and I don't have a loud voice. I don't have that much."

The police's response to Thorne's missing person case

Williams said the Long Beach Police Department (LBPd) has been treating Thorne's missing person case as if she's voluntarily missing and hasn't been taking it seriously. She told the *Signal Tribune* that she's been calling LBPd repeatedly, but police have never shared any updates on the case with her.

"Every time that I've called the police, the police have been unwilling to call me back," Williams said. "They're not good at calling back. When they have called back, they constantly told me that they had no leads or no information on Jasmine, yet the detective sounded very uncaring."

There was no press release or public statement made by LBPd informing the community of her disappearance. Not only that — it took over two years for Thorne to

be added to the California database of missing people. The *Signal Tribune* regularly looks through the online state database to find out when Long Beach residents go missing and only found out about Thorne's case because she was finally added to the database in July.

Her sister said police recently shared a different account of the events leading up to her disappearance, telling her Thorne had gotten into an argument with others in the home before storming out of the house. However, her sister emphasized that police had only recently presented this version of events to her, after her sister had been missing for over two years. This account also contradicts Thorne's godfamily's version of events, in which they never mentioned Thorne being angry when she left home.

Williams believes the reason the authorities haven't been taking the case more seriously is because she and her sister are former foster youth who don't have many people in their corner.

"Our family has been discombobulated, and I just feel like the police don't care enough, because she doesn't have enough people that care," Williams said.

The Long Beach Police Department did not immediately respond to the *Signal Tribune's* questions about Thorne's case.

Advocacy for Jasmine's case

With a lack of police support, Williams took matters into her own hands to find her sister. She began posting about her sister in missing persons groups on social media. Through social media, she met Laura Bollock, an advocate who shares information about missing persons cases online.

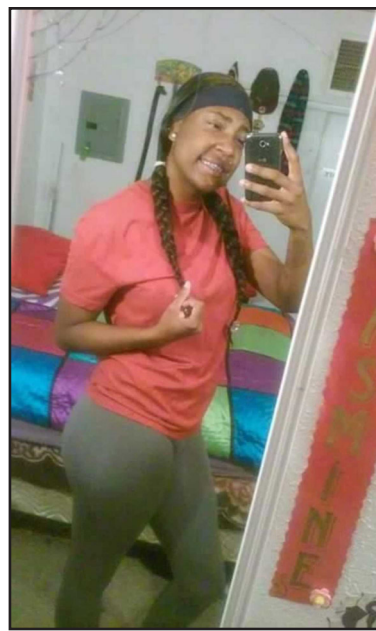

Bollock was the one who first discovered that Thorne was miss-

ing from both the state and federal databases for missing people. She began calling LBPd regularly to ask about the case and inform them that Thorne was missing from the databases. Although Thorne has now been added to the state database, she is still missing from the federal database.

"I see it a lot in missing person cases," Bollock said. "You know, the ones that get kind of lost in the missing world are the ones that are the vulnerable kids from the foster system that have family that has kind of spread out and maybe not close biological family. Very sad, but I think we're making some progress. I'm hoping we're making some progress, at least having her in the state database is a start, I'm going to get her entered in the national database as well."

Who is Jasmine Thorne?

Thorne would now be 27 years old. She is described as a Black woman with brown eyes and black hair, standing 6 feet 5 inches tall and weighing 200 pounds. She has a lollipop tattoo on her upper right forearm and an unknown tattoo on her upper left forearm. She also walks with a limp.

But far more than that — Thorne was a beloved sister, daughter and mother. And even if she wasn't any of those things, her case would still deserve attention.

"She was a beautiful person," Williams said, describing her sister. "She loved to dance, she loved to model and take pictures, she loved family. [...] She loved to goof off. She brightened people's day by being so goofy. She's the life of the party. She made everybody laugh, even when she was going through something."

Director of Public Works Eric Lopez is leaving his position, City searching for replacement

After nearly two decades of City stewardship, Director of Public Works Eric Lopez announced his departure from Long Beach.

Lopez is leaving his position to be the senior vice president of Pacifica Services, a construction and project management company in Pasadena. His last day with the City will be around Sept. 19, according to a public statement.

City Manager Tom Modica has appointed Deputy Director Joshua Hickman to serve as the Acting Director while the City searches for a permanent replacement.

"Few Public Works departments can match the scale and complexity of what we've achieved in Long Beach," Lopez said in a public statement. "From delivering more than \$1 billion in infrastructure investments to maintaining the everyday systems that keep our city running, we've expanded what public service can look like, advancing sustainability, mobility and equity throughout the community. Having grown my career with the City, it's been the greatest honor to lead this work and this team. Together, we haven't just built infrastructure and provided everyday services, we've shaped Long Beach to better serve residents and visitors alike. And now I look forward to helping

other agencies improve operations and deliver major capital projects under my new role at Pacifica Services."

Lopez served in a number of City positions before taking on the Public Works Director role in 2020. Before then, he led several City departments as Management Assistant, Administrative Analyst, Capital Projects Coordinator, Tideland Development Officer, Special Assistant to the City Manager, Project Management Officer and Bureau Manager.

With an annual departmental budget of approximately \$300 million, Mr. Lopez led a broad portfolio of City services spanning the repair, rehabilitation and upkeep of streets, sidewalks, public trees and municipal structures.

Under his direction, the department also delivered innovative micromobility programs, stormwater and waste diversion initiatives and citywide emergency support services. A key milestone under his tenure was the launch and implementation of the Elevate '28 Infrastructure Investment Plan, which has become the largest public infrastructure investment in Long Beach's history with over 180 projects and \$1.1 billion in funding to enhance Long Beach parks, streets, mobility, community facilities, water quality, climate resilience and cultural assets.

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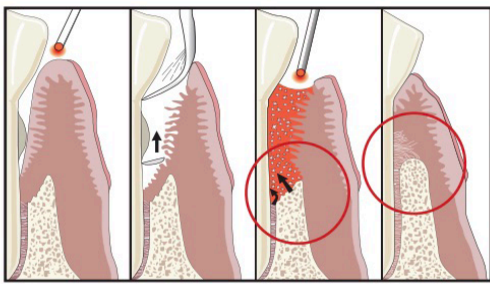

The five-person team, which has been focused on downtown and West Long Beach for the past two years, will now serve the entire city.

appropriate response rather than police officers. These teams respond to non-medical, non-violent calls and focus on community and mental health support.

The CCR team consists of a Crisis Intervention Specialist, a Public Health Nurse, a Peer Navigator, a Program Manager and a Team Supervisor. The Crisis Intervention Specialist and Public Health Nurse roles are filled by licensed professionals, according to a spokesperson with the Long Beach Health Department. Other roles are informed by lived experiences, relevant certifications and previous public health experience.

These calls include mental health crises, suicidal callers, public intoxication, unwelcome people, welfare checks and disturbances. The team does not respond to calls when a person is exhibiting violent behavior, is in possession of a weapon, is experiencing a medical emergency, is threatening or at imminent risk of hurting themselves or others, or if it has been identified that they may have committed a crime.

Residents can request CCR workers Monday through Friday from

10 a.m. to 5 p.m. by calling the non-emergency line at 562-435-6711. The City's Emergency Communications Center will then decide whether to dispatch the CCR team or police.

When responding to a call, the team introduces themselves to the individual, explains their purpose and tells the person their rights to decline or accept services, as well as the limits of confidentiality.

If needed, the Crisis Intervention Specialist leads de-escalation and provides emotional support while the Public Health Nurse and Peer Navigator assist with medical

needs and peer support.

Workers assess the person's mental, physical and social needs at the moment and develop a plan. Solutions typically consist of on-scene support, connections to services, referrals and/or transportation to additional services. Team members also provide food, water and clothing when needed.

Results of the Community Crisis Response Team, So Far

Since July 2023, the Community Crisis Response team has responded to more than 863 calls, with 59% of those calls being "resolved on-scene," according to the City of Long Beach.

Nearly half the calls responded to by CCR team was for a well-being check, while 15% was for intoxication, 7% are deemed mental health related and 37% are listed under "other reasons."

City's first permanent youth-focused shelter to open in West Long Beach

Long Beach unveiled its first shelter geared towards youth ages 18-24 who are experiencing homelessness on Wednesday afternoon.

The Youth Shelter and Navigation Center will provide temporary shelter and supportive services for 12 people at a time. The City took over a formerly vacant building in West Long Beach and began the \$4.1 million renovations for the shelter in early 2024.

Services include case management, housing navigation, three daily meals, hygiene access and connections to long-term housing and wellness resources.

The Youth Shelter and Navigation Center can house 12 youth at a time, with services including three daily meals, case management and hygiene access.

"Long Beach's new Youth Shelter and Navigation Center represents the latest step forward in our city's investments toward our goal of ending youth homelessness," said Mayor Rex Richardson in a public statement. "This center will provide youth in need with a safe place to sleep and a safe place to get the support they need to get back on their feet."

The program at the Youth Shelter and Navigation Center will begin with a 90-day enrollment period for youth experiencing homelessness, and stays may be extended as "youth work toward lasting stability and self-sufficiency," according to the City.

The facility includes restrooms, showers, laundry, a kitchenette and a lounge area, as well as 12 beds separated by a partial wall in a shared bedroom. Youth will be referred through Long Beach's Multi-Service Center or Mobile Access Center. Those who don't have transportation but are referred to the shelter throughout the city will be taken to the Youth Shelter and Navigation Center.

Long Beach identified 90 people ages 18-24 experiencing homelessness in the most recent Point in Time Count, which took place in January.

"The Youth Shelter and Navigation Center is a testament to what we can achieve when we lead with compassion," said Vice Mayor and Seventh District Councilmember Roberto Uranga in a public statement. "We are proud to welcome this vital space to West Long Beach and in turn offer our youth the support and services they need to move forward. We are committed to investing in compassionate solutions that break the cycle of homelessness."

Long Beach residents can support youth in need by donating essential items at any open Long Beach Public Library location during regular business hours or at the following sites:

- Boys & Girls Club of Long Beach (3635 Long Beach Blvd.), Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

- Scherer Park Community Center (4654 Pasadena Ave.), Monday through Friday, 3 p.m. to 6 p.m.

"Addressing youth homelessness is crucial because young people experiencing homelessness are at higher risk for mental health issues, substance abuse, trafficking and long-term chronic homelessness," said Alison King, Director of Health and Human Services in a public statement. "Early intervention can significantly improve their future stability and well-being."

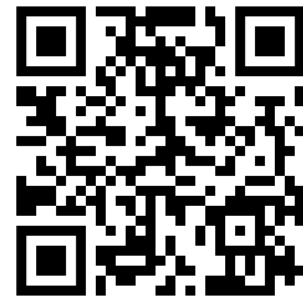

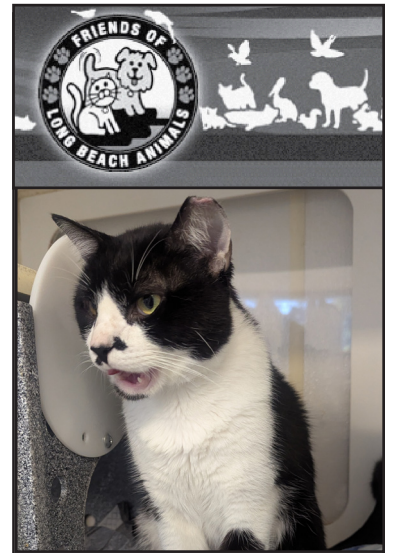

A 2023 portrait of 76-year-old Henry Lozano, who was last seen leaving his home Wednesday night in a black 2017 Audi A4.

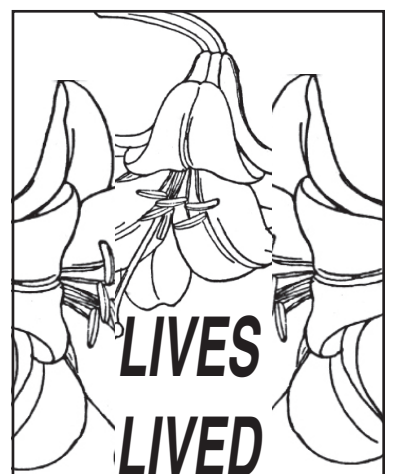

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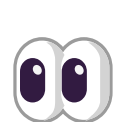
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
