Help LBUSD students and adopt-a-chick through Ground Ed's program

The spring season is a symbol for new life, one that hundreds of Long Beach elementary students will be able to witness firsthand through Ground Education's adopt-a-chick program.

Ground Education is a Signal Hill-based nonprofit that has been teaching children environmental literacy, climate resilience and nutrition for almost a decade, expanding to more Long Beach Unified School District (LBUSD) schools each year. Students at 31 elementary schools now benefit from their hands-on lessons, getting their hands dirty, trying homegrown vegetables and learning about the cultural history of foods.

Baby chicks have been a part of their curriculum since launching in 2017, but last year Ground Education took the program a step further and provided a hatching for every kindergarten and 5th grade student.

This year the adopt-a-chick program will return to LBUSD, allowing over 300 students to learn about the chick life cycle by watching their own baby grow. Residents can help the nonprofit provide this experience by contributing to their baby chick donation drive, set to launch April 12. The donation drive will run for two weeks with the goal to raise \$15,000.

"They get to hold them, they get to see them jump around and sort of see how they interact with each other," said Patti Tessen, Developmental Director of Ground

LB City Council votes to rename Cesar Chavez Park

In response to a recent New York Times investigation chronicling the abusive actions of Cesar E. Chavez, Long Beach plans to rename Cesar Chavez Park and other local streets and facilities that bear his name.

The City of Long Beach moved to rename parks, streets and facilities named after Cesar E. Chavez after a unanimous city council vote Tuesday night.

Cities such as Los Angeles, San Diego and San Antonio have moved to do the same, and the state of California will rename the March 31 holiday currently in his name. These changes come after Dolores Huerta, Ana Murguia, and Debra Rojas revealed in the *New York Times* on March 18 that Chavez sexually abused them for years. For Murguia and Rojas, they were abused by Chavez when they were children.

Long Beach's main concern is the park downtown on Golden Avenue named Cesar Chavez Park. The City of Long Beach will also rename the holiday, now known as Cesar E. Chavez Day, into a "more expansive" day of celebration that uplifts the legacy of economic justice and civil rights of the farmworkers movement, specifically recognizing the women leaders in these movements.

The renaming is now in its review process, and in the coming weeks the City will engage Latino community leaders and residents in the process, according to a statement from Mayor Rex Richardson.

"It takes an incredible amount of courage to publicly come out against someone like Cesar Chavez, whose structure was admired and hailed as heroic in the American labor movement," Councilmember Mary Zendejas said. "I am thinking of the most impacted [people] and want to continue to uplift them. Dolores Huerta, Ana Murguia and Debra Rojas. Thank you for your courage. This item outlines the thoughtfulness and the process to work with the community and other leaders on the best path forward."

Long Beach grinds out details for public cannabis use

With the highest of holidays (April 20) around the corner, Long Beach smokers can rejoice as the City moves closer to allowing residents to puff, puff, pass at special public events.

Long Beach made another step toward public cannabis use at certain permitted events, capping that number at 12 events per organizer per year and discussing what types of events need what types of permits at Tuesday's city council meeting. The item has to come back for one final reading before officially changing the City's ordinance, but will likely be ready for the summer lineup of festivals as well as the Long Beach Amphitheater's opening.

At these events, alcohol and tobacco sale and consumption will not be allowed.

This is the latest development in an item first introduced to the city council in August 2024. Since then, the City has been working with other California jurisdictions that have done the same, such as San Francisco, Sacramento and Oakland.

Long Beach has also met with workers who may be impacted by events where smoking weed is permitted, including police officers and venue workers.

These organizers must be authorized by the Long Beach Department of Cannabis Control (DCC), and are separate from a weed vendor, who is authorized by the City to sell cannabis and cannabis goods at these events. The number of vendors in the city is already capped at 40, with eight of those licenses reserved for equity applicants.

City accepting applications to participate in 43rd annual Long Beach Pride Parade

The City of Long Beach is accepting applications from groups that want to be included in the upcoming Long Beach Pride Parade on May 17.

“The Long Beach Pride Parade is a powerful expression of who we are as a city—diverse, welcoming and united in celebrating one another,” Mayor Rex Richardson said in a public statement. “We are proud to continue supporting an event that uplifts our vibrant and historic LGBTQ+ community and reflects the inclusive values that define our city.”

Organizations and businesses that want to have a float, vehicle or walk in the parade can submit an online application on the City’s website until May 4. Applications

will be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis. There will be no fee to apply or participate in the parade.

This 43rd annual event is expected to draw thousands of attendees from across the Los Angeles region. This also marks the third time in the event’s history the city government will act as the official host for the parade.

“The Long Beach Pride Parade is an impactful reminder of the strength, resilience and beauty of our city’s LGBTQ+ community,” Second District Councilmember Cindy Allen said in a public statement. “As a mother of an LGBTQ+ daughter, this event is deeply meaningful to me. It is an honor to be able to keep supporting an event that brings our city and the region together in such a powerful way.”

The Long Beach Pride Parade

will occur at the same time as the Long Beach Pride Festival, which is organized by the Long Beach Pride organization, on the weekend of May 16-17.

Long Beach allocated \$50,000 in the Fiscal Year 2026 Budget “to provide greater stability and consistency” for the event. The Port of Long Beach is also providing another \$50,000 in funding for the parade.

“The Long Beach Pride Parade reminds us that a city’s strength flows from the courage of its people to be seen, celebrated and supported. It’s a living tradition honoring the energy and spirit of our city, and the Port of Long Beach is pleased to sponsor such an important community institution,” Port of Long Beach CEO Dr. Noel Hacegaba said in a public statement.

Local nonprofit offers free diapers to underserved families

The Long Beach Community Action Partnership (LBCAP) is giving away diapers, baby wipes and training pants to families that need them.

Eligibility requirements include proof of Long Beach residency, at least one child under 5 years old in the household and proof of current WIC or CalFresh benefits. Applicants must also be able to pick up supplies at LBCAP, 117 W Victoria St.

Approved applicants will receive the following supplies for each eligible child:

•**Diaper Orders:** 80 diapers and two packs of baby wipes, in sizes 1 through 6.

•**Training Pant Orders:** 40 training pants and one pack of baby wipes, in sizes 2T/3T, 3T/4T, and 4T/5T.

“We know that essentials like diapers can add up quickly, and every family deserves access to basic necessities for their children,” said Marisa Semense, Executive Director of LBCAP in a public statement. “Through LBCAP CARES, we are proud to support Long Beach families and ease their burden with resources that make a real difference.”

Families can apply online at www.LBCAP.org/CARES. Applications will be reviewed on a first-come, first-served basis, while supplies last. Applying does not guarantee approval.

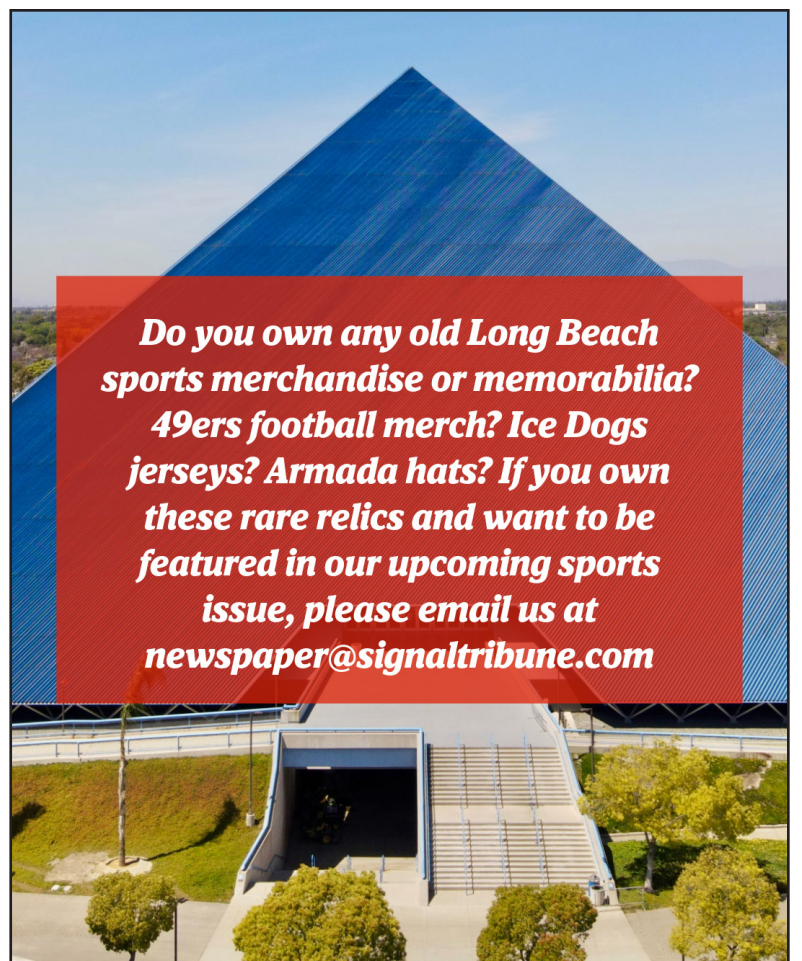

The City will engage the Latino community and local leaders in the renaming process over the next few weeks.

The city council is also asking LBUSD, Long Beach City College, Cal State Long Beach (CSULB) and other civic and cultural institutions to review their names of facilities, programs, celebrations and anything else that might be named after the disgraced labor rights leader.

It is the decision of LBUSD whether and how to rename

Cesar E. Chavez Elementary School. Councilmember Megan Kerr acknowledged LBUSD has its own renaming process, and asked that the City allow them to follow their own process.

"This is a powerful reminder that no woman should ever have to keep shameful secrets to protect a powerful figure," said Councilmember Tunua Thrash-Ntuk. She also called for a transparent community-centered process to rename the park and other facilities. "The City of Long Beach is lucky to have a set of esteemed Latino leaders who are here saying that they want to help in that renaming process."

One resident suggested naming the park after Jenny Oropeza, Long Beach's first Latina councilmember, first Latina student trustee for the CSU Board of Trustees and the first Latina Associated Students president of CSULB.

Oropeza also championed breaking LBUSD elections up into districts, ultimately giving the Latino community more representation on the board. The same resident, who did not give her name, sug-

gested changing the community center (which is now named the Jenny Oropeza Community Center)

to the Latino Cultural Center. More information on the community engagement process to

rename Cesar Chavez Park will be released in the next few weeks.

Education. "It's getting to be up close after they've been studying chicks and learning about their habits and what they do and how important they are."

Money raised for the program will go towards purchasing the eggs from an Orange County farm, feeding and caring for the chicks, and the incubation process. Students will be able to witness the entire life cycle of the chicks and be able to hold the babies once they are old enough to do so.

This program is just the latest in a robust curriculum Ground Ed has been offering and expanding over the last nine years. Over 17,000 students in LBUSD have learned about pickling vegetables, the role mushrooms play in the ecosystem, how to grow their own food, recipes made from vegetable scraps, composting and much more. Ground Ed also makes an effort to connect their lessons to what the students may be learning in the classroom, integrating math, science and history lessons from the desk to the garden.

For the chick program, students will learn about the life cycle of chickens, along with many other animals within their ecosystem, as well as the history of chickens, both culturally and evolutionarily. The baby chicks will be kept safe in incubators at Ground Ed's Signal Hill office for the most part, but the nonprofit will take chicks to and from schools throughout the process so students can watch them grow over the weeks.

While most of the students are too young to care for the chicks themselves, they'll be able to watch Ground Ed staff feed, house and care for them. Eventually, the students will be able to hold their baby chicks themselves. Hessen said the entire process from egg to a hatching ready to live on a farm should take about two months.

Those who donate to the program will be able to name their baby chick, and will receive a photo and certificate of the baby bird they adopted.

Residents can experience the

journey on Ground Ed's Chick Cam on their YouTube channel, which will be launched mid-April. Last year's videos show babies popping

out of little eggs in a small incubator, stretching their wings and curiously pecking towards one another.

Two of these equity vendors are success stories through Long Beach's Cannabis Equity program, and six more equity applicants are expected to open this year, according to Valencia Romero, manager of Cannabis Oversight. The vendors have their licenses, but are not open to the public yet.

If an organizer wants to host an event where people can smoke weed, they can do so on public or private properties, as the City already has permitting processes in place for both options. The organizer also has to obtain a Cannabis Event Organizer License and Temporary Cannabis Event License from the City.

A "Temporary Cannabis Event" can range from one to four days where cannabis can be sold and smoked, drunk or consumed. Only people 21 and older can attend these events, and sellers must have a license to sell weed. These events can only be held at a county fair event, district agricultural association event or at an avenue separately approved by the City.

The City listed possible venues such as the Queen Mary, Marina Green Park, Rainbow Lagoon, Shoreline Park, the Long Beach Convention & Entertainment Center and the Long Beach Amphitheater once it's open. Events cannot take place within 1,000 feet of a school, daycare center or youth center while children are present. Councilmember Thrash-Ntuk asked that the City consider adding senior centers to this 1,000-yard buffer, though that addition will not be part of the final reading.

Organizers must promote responsible cannabis consumption and safe alternatives to driving, such as ride-share options or designated drivers. This can be done through signage at the event as well as digital promotion of these safety measures.

Large-scale events are the most anticipated, City staff said, which will require a special event permit.

For a smaller event at a local business, organizers will have to obtain an Occasional Event Per-

mit, for a one-day event, similar to when a business wants to host live music for a day.

Every organizer will have to submit an equity plan as part of their permit application. This plan will outline how the organizer will support verified equity applicants and businesses, such as:

- Offering reduced event vendor, exhibitor, booth or sponsor fees
- Displaying and selling cannabis products manufactured by verified equity businesses
- Allocating vendor spaces for licensed equity dispensaries
- Providing mentorship opportunities during event day

In order for a vendor to sell weed at a Long Beach event, they must have a cannabis retail license issued by Long Beach.

The City can force cannabis sales and consumption to stop at any time during an event in order to "protect public health or safety" or to assure organizers are following State and City laws. Organizers are also responsible for removing anyone from their event who is selling products without a Long Beach-issued license or not following City or State law.

Councilmember Suely Saro asked if the City can receive a report after the first year allowing public cannabis-use events covering revenue and safety impacts.

Councilmembers Kristina Duggan and Megan Kerr both dissented from the item, citing concerns of smoke drifting into neighborhoods.

Pet of the week: Onyx

Onyx is 7 years old and has spent over a year in a kennel at Long Beach Animal Care Services. He's what the shelter staff and volunteers call a longtime legend, and no one can figure out why he hasn't been adopted yet. Onyx was (and is) a shelter favorite. He's young at heart, playful and affectionate. He's also a survivor. During his shelter stay, his leg swelled up and he couldn't use it. 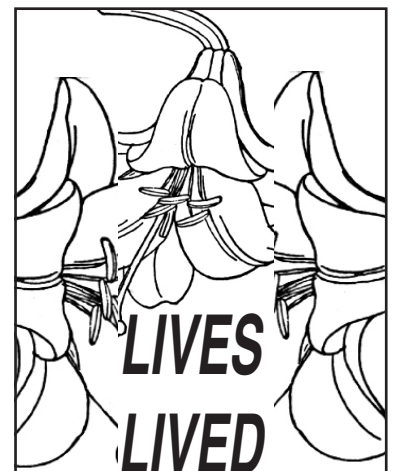
