The plan to fix one of Long Beach’s most dangerous corridors

The Pacific Avenue Corridor Improvements Project aims to make a busy 2-mile stretch more walkable by adding street signals, bike lanes and more by 2028.

The City of Long Beach will pour \$34 million into a two-year, 2-mile infrastructure project on the westside, deemed the Pacific Avenue Corridor Improvements Project. This stretch of Pacific Avenue between Pacific Coast Highway and Wardlow Road is one of the busiest in the city, and has been identified as the fourth most dangerous corridor for vehicles, bicyclists and pedestrians.

Long Beach’s Transportation Project Management Bureau, within the Public Works Department, presented preliminary designs, goals and a brief timeline during a virtual meeting Wednesday evening.

According to data between 2018 and 2022, this corridor has had five fatal collisions and 292 pedestrian/bicyclist crashes during that timeframe. The Pacific Avenue Corridor Improvement Project will directly address four high-injury intersections: two vehicle and two pedestrian/bicycle.

Some highlights of the project include:

- Bus shelters:** 23 new bus shelters will be installed at existing stops, and some bus stops will be moved to accommodate new bike lanes
- ADA accessibility:** 33 new ADA-compliant ramps will be constructed, as well as 12 curb extensions/bulb-outs and revamped sidewalks at multiple locations
- Traffic signals:** Six intersections will be receiving traffic signals for the first time, while existing signals will be upgraded. The City will also be implementing corridor-wide coordination between signals, managed by video surveillance.
- Roadway improvements:** New pavement striping and signs will be installed, while roads will receive resurfacing
- Bike lanes:** The corridor will receive 3.2 miles of newly striped class II bike lanes, as well as 0.8 miles of class IV bike lanes (with a physical barrier)

Signal Hill council votes for a 10% pay bump

Signal Hill City Council voted Tuesday evening to increase its pay, as well as the City Clerk’s and City Treasurer’s pay, by 10%, effective in early December.

Each of the five councilmembers’ pay will increase from \$794.40 monthly to \$873.84. Annually, councilmembers will go from making \$9,532.80 to \$10,486.08. Signal Hill’s mayor gets paid the same amount as each of the councilmembers.

The City Clerk and Treasurer will go from making \$482.04 monthly to \$530.24. Annually, these two positions will now make \$6,362.88.

Councilmembers also receive additional pay for serving on various committees, of which the spots are self-appointed. The City’s most recent report of public official appointments (CA Form 806) is from 2025. California requires cities to report all public official appointments that come with additional compensation, as well as any monetary changes to those appointments.

The *Signal Tribune* requested the most recent copy of Signal Hill’s CA Form 806 on July 16 and did not receive the document at the time of publication.

According to the 2025 CA Form 806, all city councilmembers serve on the Sanitation District board and

receive \$125 monthly, or \$1,500 annually. Members are only paid for the meetings they attend.

Former Long Beach Mayor and current Congressman Robert Garcia announced Tuesday a \$225 million investment into the Port of Long Beach from the U.S. House of Representatives' Transportation and Infrastructure Committee.

The investment, which will be split between the federal government and the Port's channel-deepening project, comes with approval under the Water Resources Development Act. The money will go towards expanding the Port's main channel, strengthening its supply chain and reducing pollution from ships waiting to dock outside the harbor.

"This is a huge win for Long Beach, for our workers, and for people across the country who depend on goods moving through our port every single day," Garcia said in a public statement. "I've been fighting for this project since my days as Mayor of Long Beach, and today we took a major step toward getting it done."

The investment is meant to help the Port lower costs, prevent cargo delays and reduce pollution from ships idling outside the harbor. Garcia also helped to secure \$283 million for the Port in December 2023 for its Pier B On-Dock Rail support Facility Program, which connected the Port with inland rail yards and reduced truck traffic.

Now that this investment has

been approved by the Transportation and Infrastructure Committee, it will go in front of the House of Representatives for a full vote, and in front of the President in the next few months for final approval.

"Ports and the supply chain are vital to our economy, enabling commerce and energizing business activity across the nation. Federal investment in maritime infrastructure is crucial to bolstering the economic output created by trade, and reauthorizing the Water Resources Development Act is an important step to ensuring we are optimizing America's trade opportunities," said Port of Long Beach Chief Executive Officer Dr. Noel Hacegaba in a public statement.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN pursuant to Section 15082 of the State Guidelines for Implementation of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) (14 California Code of Regulations Section 15000 et seq.: the state CEQA Guidelines) that the City of Signal Hill (City) intends to prepare a Program Environmental Impact Report (EIR) in connection with preparing a draft amendment to its Zoning Ordinance that would establish an Overlay Zoning District (proposed project). In compliance with Public Resources Code Section 21067 and state CEQA Guidelines Section 15050, the City is the lead agency responsible for preparation of a Program EIR addressing potential impacts associated with the proposed project. The purpose of this notice is to (1) serve as a Notice of Preparation (NOP) of and Initial Study for the Draft Program EIR pursuant and (2) advise and solicit comments regarding the content of the Draft Program EIR.

Notice of Preparation: Pursuant to Public Resources Code Section 21083 and CEQA Guidelines Section 15082, the NOP will be available for a 32-day public review from Friday, July 17, 2026, through Monday, August 17, 2026. Pursuant to Public Resources Code Section 21080.4, responsible and trustee agencies must submit any comments in response to this notice prior to the close of the specified public review period. The NOP and Initial Study are available to be viewed online at www.cityofsignalhill.org and at the Community Development Department of City Hall at 2175 Cherry Avenue between the hours of 8:00 am to 5:00 pm, Monday through Thursday, and 8:00 am to 4:00 pm on Fridays.

Written Comments: The City, as lead agency, requests that responsible and trustee agencies respond in a manner consistent with Section 15082(b) of the CEQA Guidelines. Project Location: The proposed project is in the City of Signal Hill encompassing approximately 263 acres across numerous parcels distributed throughout the city (district area). The district area is within the northern portion of the city, generally situated north of East Willow Street and south of Interstate (I) 405. The district area is largely within the Long Beach Oil Field, where existing land uses include oil production facilities, industrial uses, storage yards, and underutilized or vacant parcels. The Housing Elements sites (the Special Purpose Housing Specific Plan, SP-7 and Town Center Northwest Specific Plan, SP-24), are not included as a part of the proposed project.

Project Description: The proposed project includes preparation of a draft amendment to the City's Zoning Ordinance that would establish an Overlay Zoning District. The proposed project is a regulatory framework and does not include, authorize, or approve any site-specific development projects. All future development or redevelopment within the Overlay Zoning District would remain subject to City review and the standard entitlement process.

The zoning ordinance amendment would provide for three distinct overlay zones: (1) Innovation and Enterprise Zone; (2) Community Core Zone; and (3) Workshop and Entertainment Zone.

The proposed project guides future development and redevelopment that would be implemented within the district area. The proposed overlay zones would be applied on top of the city's existing zoning districts. The overlay zones support gradual redevelopment with existing uses permitted to continue to ensure a smooth transition and integration with new development. While the underlying zoning would remain in place, the overlay zones would modify permitted and conditionally permitted uses, development standards, and design requirements to provide additional flexibility and incentivize redevelopment. The overlay zones may refine the list of permitted and conditionally permitted uses, designate certain conditionally permitted uses as permitted uses, or require use permits, site plan, and design review for specific uses.

The overlay zones would include tailored development standards and design guidelines specific to each overlay zone such as maximum densities for residential uses; building height limits; floor to ceiling height; lot area dimensions (e.g., setbacks, lot coverage); building separation and orientation; open space requirements; pedestrian paseos, trails, and sidewalks requirements; screening and buffers; and parking standards. These development and design standards ensure high-quality site planning and building design. The overlay zones would also require appropriate buffers and compatibility measures for sensitive uses such as residential development adjacent to existing industrial or oil-related operations.

Application of each overlay zone is intended to incentivize new development projects in areas of the city with underutilized and/or aging property. In the event of a conflict between the underlying zoning and an overlay zone, the provisions of the overlay zone shall govern. The provisions of the Overlay Zoning District do not apply to parcels that have been developed entirely under the underlying zone, provided that all requirements of the underlying zone are met except as specifically approved otherwise by variance or other action by the City. Any new structure or addition to an existing structure on a property that uses the underlying zone is prohibited except as dictated below for existing commercial and industrial buildings. A building may be adaptively redeveloped for a conforming permitted land use for the overlay zone.

Nonconforming lots, structures, or uses existing in the Overlay Zoning District that do not conform with the Overlay Zoning District standards may be continued but may not be constructed, established, altered, modified, reconstructed, replaced, or enlarged in any way which increases the nonconformity. Any modification to an existing non-conforming use and structure is subject to requirements in Chapter 20.82 of the Signal Hill Municipal Code. Full buildout of the proposed project would result in a net increase of 1,032 dwelling units and a shift in land use from industrial and oil-related uses to a mix of commercial, office, residential, and research and development land uses. Total employment would increase from 4,484 to 4,743 employees, representing a net increase of 259 employees.

Environmental Issues: Potential environmental effects include aesthetics, air quality, biological resources, cultural resources, energy, geology and soils, greenhouse gas emissions, hazards and hazardous materials, hydrology and water quality, land use/planning, mineral resources, noise, population and housing, public services, recreation, transportation, tribal cultural resources, and utilities and service systems. These topics will be addressed in the Program EIR. In addition, the Program EIR will describe and evaluate project alternatives that may reduce or avoid any identified significant adverse impacts of the project. Unless new information identifying other potential impacts is presented during the scoping process, the following topics, discussed in the Initial Study, will not be discussed further in the EIR: agriculture and forestry, and wildfire.

Most of the funding for this \$34 million project comes from a grant via Safe Streets and Roads For All, a federal program that has so far distributed \$3.9 billion to cities to "prevent roadway fatalities and serious injuries." That grant accounts for 73%, or roughly \$24.8 million of the project's funding, while Long Beach is paying for the remaining 27%, or roughly \$9 million.

According to the City of Long Beach, the grant funding cannot be used for any project that would "reduce roadway capacity or level of service for vehicles," remove lanes or add any new vehicular lanes. The grant money had to be used specifically for roadway safety projects that reduce injuries and fatalities, manage vehicle speed or create safe routes to school and transit.

A handful of residents at the meeting voiced their dissatisfaction with the project, saying the City is spending a lot of money for little changes.

"It really feels like this is disingenuous to call this a safety project," an attendee, who did not provide a name, said during the Q&A portion of the meeting. He asked if the bulk of the costs were going towards repaving roads.

Transportation Project Bureau Manager Mouhsen Habib replied that a lot of the money is also going toward ADA accessibility, \$1 million for each new traffic signal installation, consultation services and more.

A traffic engineering worker with the City added that they were not allowed to make lanes smaller since they have a minimum width requirement, and said the bike barriers and traffic signal coordination will also help force speeding cars to slow down.

Details of the Pacific Avenue Corridor Improvements Project are as follows:

From Pacific Coast Highway to West 31st Street

This stretch makes up the bulk of the project at roughly 1.5 miles. This area will receive sidewalk repairs, a newly striped bike lane

(no barrier), new striping between vehicle lanes, a repaved road, new protections around existing medians and one additional median.

At the intersection of Pacific Avenue and West Hill Street, the City will upgrade the already existing traffic signal, refresh the sidewalks, install a new curb extension and ADA accessible ramps, put in new safety lighting and install a bus shelter at the already existing bus stop.

One intersection north, at West 23rd Street, a new traffic signal will be installed, as well as new curb extensions and ADA curb ramps, on-street ADA parking, new crosswalks and a newly paved and striped roadway. Bike lanes already exist at this stretch, and the stripes separating bicyclists from cars will be repainted.

From West 31 Street to Wardlow Road

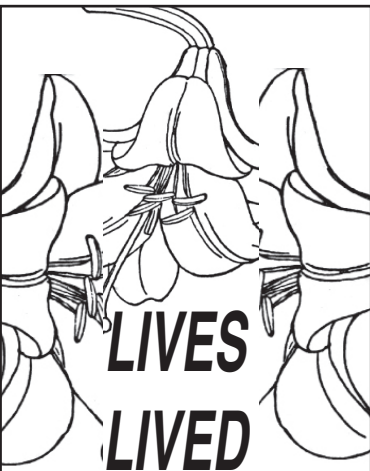
The remaining half-mile stretch

of the project will receive a bike lane where there is currently none. The bike lanes in this area will have a physical barrier made up of flexible, vertical PEXCO bollards on one side and a raised stretch of pavement on the other side of the road.

This area will also get redone sidewalks, restriped pavement and slight pavement repaving.

At the intersection of Pacific Avenue and West 31st Street, the City will introduce a new traffic signal, as well as the start of new bike lanes protected by a raised median on both sides of the road. The street will also be repaved and restriped, with car lanes slightly shifted to make room for the bike lanes, and a new bus stop will be introduced.

Long Beach expects to begin construction on the Pacific Avenue Corridor Improvements Project later this year and estimates completion in late 2028.
