SUPERHEROES SHIELD UP FOR SCHOOL RETURNS

Long Beach’s Department of Health and Human Services will host Superheroes Shield Up for School on Aug. 11 at the Main Health Facility (2525 Grand Ave.) from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m.

The superhero-themed event will help families prepare for the new school year with school-required vaccinations, connections to community resources and family-friendly activities.

Children and teens ages 18 and younger who are uninsured, enrolled in Medi-Cal or identify as American Indian or Alaska Native are eligible to receive school-required vaccinations at the event.

The event will offer all vaccines required for school enrollment, including Tdap boosters for students entering seventh grade, free of charge.

California law requires students entering transitional kindergarten, kindergarten and seventh grade to meet specific immunization requirements before attending school.

The Health Department’s Sensory Area For Everyone (S.A.F.E.) vehicle will be available on-site, providing a quiet, inclusive vaccination space for kids with sensory needs.

“Childhood vaccinations play a critical role in keeping our community healthy,” Mayor Rex Richardson said in a public statement. “This free event helps students prepare for a return to school while providing families with valuable health resources.”

LB reviews 2025 budget report as growing deficit looms

As Long Beach stares down an ever-increasing budget deficit heading into next year, city officials are seeking revenue streams and ways to cut back without terminating programs residents rely on.

The Financial Management Department presented the Annual Comprehensive Financial Report for fiscal year 2024-25 on July 21, laying out the City’s assets, expenses and more. Representatives from Public Works, Fire and Police departments presented key performance statistics to Long Beach City Council as their departments’ budgets were briefly reviewed. However, no changes or suggestions to their budgets were made during the meeting.

Assets

Long Beach’s largest chunk of money consists of capital assets, currently priced at \$6.6 billion. This category accounts for investments in equipment and vehicles, buildings and land owned by the City and infrastructure. This does not, however, represent available financial resources, meaning they cannot be used to fund any services or programs.

The City’s next biggest budget line is \$2.2 billion in cash assets. The City’s ratio of cash assets to priorities is at 193%, a 41% decrease from

Students deserve the full picture. They also deserve the full support system.

This opinion-editorial was written by Kennedy Dixon, a veteran school counselor in the Long Beach Unified School District (LBUSD), as well as a former assistant principal and student support services administrator.

Former Long Beach Unified Superintendent Dr. Jill Baker’s recent commentary rightly celebrates the importance of giving students meaningful pathways to college, careers and life. Expanded Career Technical Education (CTE) pathways, dual enrollment opportunities, internships and partnerships with Long Beach City College have created valuable opportunities for many students, and those accomplishments deserve recognition.

As I read her commentary, however, I found myself asking a different question: **Who ensures every student can actually access those opportunities?**

That question has guided much of my work throughout more than three decades in Long Beach Unified.

Throughout my career, I have learned that programs alone do not change lives. **Relationships do. Systems do.**

Students do not automatically discover the pathway that best fits their interests and abilities. They do not instinctively know how to navigate graduation requirements, financial aid, college admissions, apprenticeships, military service or career opportunities. Many also carry burdens that make planning for the future difficult — family instability, anxiety, trauma, poverty, homelessness or simply the

belief that college or a meaningful career is for someone else. Someone has to help them see what is possible. For countless students, that someone is a school counselor.

“The challenge is that the current structure of Long Beach Unified’s school counseling program often does not provide counselors with the time, organizational support or comprehensive framework needed to consistently build the kinds of sustained, relationship-based connections that change lives.”

Long before students apply to college or begin internships, school counselors help students improve attendance, overcome personal challenges, develop academic plans, explore careers, build resilience and connect today’s classroom to tomorrow’s opportunities. Comprehensive school counseling is not another initiative competing for limited resources. It is

the infrastructure that connects students to every other initiative. For years, Long Beach Unified has rightly embraced the ideals of equity and excellence. But building pathways without ensuring students have sufficient guidance to access and successfully navigate those pathways is not truly equity, nor is it excellence. Equity is not simply creating opportunities. It is ensuring every student has meaningful access to those opportunities. Excellence is measured not only by the number of programs a district offers, but by whether every student has the guidance, support and relationships needed to benefit from them. Ironically, many of the outcomes highlighted in Dr. Baker’s commentary — student voice, individualized pathways, college and career readiness, informed decision-making and equitable access to opportunity — are precisely the outcomes comprehensive school counseling programs are designed to achieve. The challenge has always been the lack of a comprehensive system that ensures every student can benefit from that vision. As I wrote in my previous *Signal Tribune* op-ed, comprehensive school counseling was never really about counselors. It has always been about creating the conditions teachers need to teach, students need to learn and school counselors need to provide the support that helps make both possible. That same conviction guided the 2022 report I authored on be-

half of the Teachers Association of Long Beach School Counselors Organizing Committee, “Reimagining School Counseling in the Long Beach Unified School District.” The report outlined a roadmap for building a comprehensive TK–12 school counseling program aligned with California’s Comprehensive School Counseling Standards. Since then, I have shared those recommendations with district leadership and the Board of Education because I continue to believe every child deserves equitable access to the guidance, relationships and support that make opportunity possible. One conversation has stayed with me for years. A few years ago, Board Member Erik Miller spoke to a group of school counselors and parents who

were advocating for the adoption of California’s Comprehensive School Counseling Standards in Long Beach Unified. During his remarks, Mr. Miller shared a story he has told publicly on several occasions. Raised by a single mother in Long Beach, he recalled that during middle school he had begun running with the wrong crowd. Then a school counselor stepped in. He called Erik into his office. He built a relationship with him. He listened. He encouraged him. He challenged him. Most importantly, he connected him with programs and opportunities that changed the direction of his life. Mr. Miller has publicly credited

that counselor with helping save him during one of the most vulnerable periods of his life. After he finished speaking, I told Mr. Miller that if a young man with the same circumstances entered today’s Long Beach Unified, I worried he might never receive the same level of timely, relationship-based support that changed the course of his own life.

Why? Not because today’s school counselors are any less dedicated or committed. Quite the opposite. The challenge is that the current structure of Long Beach Unified’s school counseling program often does not provide counselors with the time, organizational support or comprehensive framework needed to consistently build the kinds of sustained, relationship-based connections that change lives.

Eager to lead? Applications for Youth Advisory Council open through Aug. 7

As Long Beach’s Youth Advisory Council prepares to welcome its fifth annual cohort, local youth ages 16 to 26 are invited to simultaneously lead and contribute to the city’s future. In this role, councilmembers will have the opportunity to work on City policies, programs and funding related to the city’s youth, such as the Youth and Emerging Adults Strategic Plan, the annual Youth Summit and Measure US Youth Fund investments. The Youth Advisory Council falls under the Long Beach Department of Health and Human Services’ Office of Youth Development. “Investing in young people means investing in the future of Long Beach,” said Mayor Rex Richardson in a public statement. “Our Youth Advisory Council continues to demonstrate that young people bring valuable ideas, fresh perspectives and real leadership to City decision making. Their voices help shape policies and programs that strengthen our community.” Eligibility requirements for the Youth Advisory Council include the following:

- Be between 16 and 26 years old by Sept. 1
- Live in Long Beach
- Be available to attend two-hour meetings twice each month at locations across the city
- Have a passion for issues affecting youth in Long Beach

The Youth Advisory Council consists of nine members representing

each of the Long Beach City Council districts and two at-large members pursuing health equity in neighborhoods disproportionately impacted by violence, poverty and adverse health outcomes. According to the City, the members ensure diverse youth perspectives are reflected in City initiatives.

Additional benefits for members include a \$50 stipend per meeting, up to \$1,100 for the full term, as well as professional coaching and leadership development opportunities courtesy of City Staff. Applications can be accessed through the online application portal. Youth who don’t have computer or smartphone access may submit an application at the Ronald R. Arias Health Equity Center (6335 Myrtle Ave.), at any of the dozen Long Beach Public Library branches or at one of the six Parks, Recreation and Marine Teen Centers during regular business hours. Those who have been selected will be notified around four weeks after the application deadline. “Serving on the Youth Advisory

Council changed the way I think about leadership and civic engagement,” said Nyechele Shaw, current Youth Advisory Councilmember, in a public statement. “We weren’t just asked for our opinions, we were trusted to help shape real projects that affect young people across Long Beach. It showed me that youth voices aren’t just valued: they’re essential.” This past year, Youth Advisory Council members have participated in the City’s Mental Health is Just Health campaign and the Youth Voices series with the Long Beach Community Action Partnership and the Public Access Digital Network. They’ve also guided the Youth Power Participatory Budgeting process for Measure US Youth Fund investments and organized the three-day youth empowerment event Youth Connect 2026. The Youth Advisory Council was founded in 2022 as a result of that year’s Youth Design Sessions and is aligned with Long Beach’s Youth & Emerging Adults Strategic Plan. The event will also feature free food, back-to-school giveaways, games, superhero-themed activities and opportunity prize drawings for children who receive a vaccine. Families are encouraged to attend dressed as their favorite superheroes.

“Just as superheroes help keep their communities safe, vaccinations are one of the most effective

ways to protect children from serious diseases,” Acting Health Officer Dr. Cliff Okada said in a public statement. “Vaccines help students stay healthy, reduce missed school days and safeguard those who cannot be vaccinated. Every shot is a small act of heroism that brings us one step closer to building a healthier, stronger Long Beach.”

Last year, the Health Department administered nearly 200 doses of required vaccines at back-to-school clinics, helping families meet California’s immunization requirements before the school year began.

Vaccine appointments are recommended and can be scheduled through MyTurn in English and Spanish. Walk-ins will also be accommodated. Families are encouraged to bring their child’s immunization record.

2023-24. If that ratio falls below 100%, City staff said this would indicate the City doesn’t have enough cash to pay for its short-term obligations. Short-term obligations include the current programs and services that the City provides, from libraries and parks to scheduled events.

This decrease is mostly due to a deficit in the City’s general fund, which is why Long Beach had to draw into its reserves this year, a representative from the Financial Management Department said.

Money Owed

Long Beach currently owes \$1.6 billion in bonds, or long-term debt obligations. This number has decreased from \$1.7 billion in 2022-23. However, its total debt owed sits at \$2.4 billion.

The Financial Management Department has broken down the City’s long-term debt obligations into four categories:

- **Bonds Payable:** \$1.58 billion
- **Notes, Loans and Lines of Credit:** \$498.58 million
- **Civic Center Long-Term Obligation:** \$268.46 million
- **Finance Purchase Obligations:** \$87.87 million

The bonds payable portion of the City’s debt consists of dozens of individual obligations, Director of Long Beach Financial Management Department Kevin Ripper told the *Signal Tribune*. The largest of those obligations are to the Port of Long Beach (\$533 million) and the City’s Gas Utility Fund (\$472 million).

In addition, the City also owes \$1.3 billion to CalPERS, an employee retirement fund service, split between the public safety fund with CalPERS and miscellaneous (all other City employees). Long Beach will pay \$160 million over the next year to begin paying off this debt,

according to Ripper. The City estimates this will be paid off in the next 15 years.

This debt with CalPERS began in 1950, when the City first enrolled its employees under CalPERS, Ripper told the *Signal Tribune*. Long Beach is contractually obligated to pay back the full cost of its employees’ public retirement and pension benefits. Over the last few decades, both the cost of these services and the pension liability have increased, the latter more quickly.

“The cost of doing business and providing services has grown significantly and dramatically. I think it’s important for folks to understand that,” Mayor Rex Richardson said at the end of the presentation. “And we’re seeing the long-term effects of Proposition 13 in California, where other states have the ability to—their property taxes grow and ours do not—not at the same rate on residential businesses and properties where the majority of our revenue comes from property taxes.”

Revenue & Expenses

The largest revenue sources for the City are taxes (43.7%) and grants (24.3%), which account for 68% of Long Beach’s revenue, followed by charges for services (17.7%).

The largest expense for the City is its public safety fund at 42%, which includes the police and fire departments, followed by the community and cultural programs at

21.4%. The next largest expenses are public works (17%) and public health (11%).

General Fund

The City’s general fund is made up mostly of taxes, which account for 67.7% of the general fund, followed by charges for services (7.7%), licenses and permits (6.9%), “other financing sources” (3.7%), franchise fees (3.5%) and fines and forfeitures (2.4%). The total general fund for fiscal year 2024-25 was \$722 million.

A city’s general fund is the money that can be used for basic services for residents, such as street repairs and keeping libraries open.

Long Beach spent an excess of \$34 million out of its general fund in fiscal year 2024-25, going from spending \$759 million in 2023-24 to spending \$793 million last fiscal year.

Given last year’s general fund revenue and spending, Long Beach is faced with a deficit of about \$70 million going into next year. To cover last year’s \$60 million deficit, the City used \$31 million from planned 2024 reserves to cover the deficit, and covered the rest with remaining Long Beach Recovery Act funds (\$15.9 million), CARES

Act funding (\$5.4 million) and operating reserves (\$7.8 million).

The City also has \$50 million in its reserves, enough money to support its current programming for one and a half months.

“I’m concerned that we’re not investing enough to maintain the services our community relies on every single day. We can launch new projects [and] programs, but they aren’t going to matter if we don’t keep people safe, collect their trash and maintain basic infrastructure such as our streets, sidewalks, medians and trees,” Third District Councilmember Kristina Duggan said.

Fifth District Councilmember Megan Kerr brought up how certain companies are facing staffing shortages due to their immigrant employees being unable to work, and how this might affect the City’s projects and associated costs.

“It’s important I think as we enter budget season to acknowledge that there are really big forces happening that impact us in significant ways that might have nothing to do with the work that we’re doing here in Long Beach or the way that we’re trying to do the work,” Kerr said.

Get a free gun safe at this Aug. 4 event across Long Beach

During the Long Beach Health Department's Aug. 4 event, 67 firearm safes will be distributed for free at three local participating locations.

In an effort to prevent gun-related injuries, the Long Beach Health Department will be giving away free firearm safes at three locations on Aug. 4.

Safes will be given away on a first-come, first-served basis and there is no registration required to receive a safe. This giveaway, returning for its second year, is also meant to protect children, prevent firearm theft and reduce unauthorized access to guns.

Residents may pick up one free firearm safe per household, weighing approximately 10 pounds and capable of storing up to two handguns, along with educational materials on responsible firearm storage and safety.

"We saw tremendous community interest in this program last year, which demonstrated how important safe firearm storage resources are for Long Beach families," said Mayor Rex Richardson in a public statement. "Safe firearm storage is one of the most effective ways to help reduce unintentional shootings, youth access to firearms and firearm theft. The City continues to invest in evidenced-based violence prevention and public safety strategies that help protect residents and strengthen community."

The City will distribute approximately 67 safes at each of the three participating Health Department locations. Residents are encouraged to arrive when distribution sites open, as supplies are limited and expected to be distributed quickly.

During the one-day event last year, all available safes were claimed within 15 minutes.

The distribution will begin at 8:30 a.m. at the following locations:

- Main Health (2525 Grand Ave.)
- Miller Family Health Education Center (3820 Cherry Ave.)
- Ron Arias Health Equity Center (6335 Myrtle Ave.)

Residents must not bring their firearms to distribution locations. Weapons of any kind, including firearms, are prohibited at City facilities.

"Firearm injuries are preventable, and safe storage is a proven strategy to reduce risk," said Dr. Cliff Okada, Acting City Health Officer, in a public statement. "By securely storing firearms, residents can help prevent accidental shootings, unauthorized access, theft and suicide-related harm, contributing to a safer community for all."

Funding for the program comes from the City Council-approved Fiscal Year 2026 Racial Equity and Reconciliation Budget, which includes \$40,000 in one-time funding to support the City's Racial Equity and Reconciliation initiative.

According to national public health data, firearms are the leading cause of death among children and adolescents in the United States. To help prevent firearm-related injuries and deaths, the Health Department encourages parents and caregivers to follow the Everytown for Gun Safety Be SMART framework for responsible firearm storage and safety.

- Secure all guns in your home and vehicles
- Model responsible behavior around guns
- Ask about unsecured guns in other homes
- Recognize the role of guns in suicide
- Tell your peers to Be SMART

Day's solo work and albums with The Time have exceeded 10 million units sold.

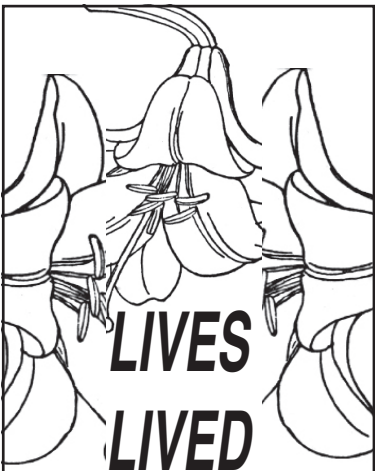
